The Cowford County Band is going to be there and they have never believed in copying material from other groups. This group, which Jacksonville calls its own, takes its name from the time when Jacksonville was little more than a wide spot in the road known as Cowford County.

Since its debut in the Jacksonville Coliseum on August 7, 1974, the band has given concerts with Dave Mason, Edgar Winter, Loggins and Messina, Jimmy Buffet, Roy Buchanan, Sea Level, Lynyrd Skynryd, Charley Daniels and the Ozark Mountain Daredevils.

The group's roots are southern and contemporary. Its music consists of rock 'n roll, blues, jazz and country but the style and sound cannot be confined within the framework of any single type of music.

The reason for its diversity in sound may be found in the band's members as each is truly individual.

The group doesn't play many local clubs since they don't like to play other performers material but prefer to build up an entire show consisting of original songs rather than throwing together a hasty show of Top 40 material.

So, if you're tired of hearing the same songs done by several different performers, give the ears a break; be at the Boathouse on October 8 to hear some good, original music.

Those looking for good entertainment at bargain prices should try UNF this fall. The Office of Student Activities and the Council of Fine Arts have a calendar filled with events which fit the above description. The price is right, too, for everything is free.

Beginning with the Cowford County Band, which will perform during the Student Activities Happy Hour on Friday, October 8, everything from good movies to good art exhibits is on the Fall agenda.

After Happy Hour on the 8th, The Reincarnation of Peter Proud, will be shown in the UNF Assembly Hall. Saturday, October 9, bring the family and picnic with Mike Johnson and his "Sounds of Bluegrass". This well-known group will perform with several popular entertainers such as The Mildew Brothers and "Red and Murphy".

Arthur Bloomer, Fine Arts Assistant Professor of Music, will present a recital featuring both organ and harpsichord 17th and 18th century music. The harpsichord to be used is a replica of the mideighteenth century French instrument. The recital will take place on October 15, 8:30 p.m., at St. Paul's By-The-Sea Episcopal Church, Jacksonville Beach.

Also on this date, Friday, October 15, The Asphyx, a real chiller thriller horror movie, will be shown in the UNF Assembly Hall, building 9, at 7:45 p.m.

For those of you interested in art, the first major exhibit of the season will be on view in the UNF library foyer and student commons area from October 18 through November 5. Featured in the exhibit will be three Jacksonville University art professors; Mun Quan, Barre Barrett and William Persick.

On October 22, the Chicago Free Street Theatre, an improvisational drama troupe, will be on campus. Performances will be at noon and at 7:30 p.m. Between those performances, the troupe will be involved in a workshop in music at 1:30 and a theater workshop at 3 p.m. Students from UNF, FJC, JU and Edward Waters College are invited to attend.

The most famous of all super heroes will be featured in the UNF Assembly Hall on Friday, October 29, when <u>Superman</u> is on the movie agenda. Bring a large bag of popcorn (or get one from the vending machine) and relive the days of Louis Lane and Clark Kent, reporters from <u>The</u> Daily Planet.

Expect something unusual in the way of folk music when Gene Cotton appears here on November 5. He will be the featured performer for the Student Activities Happy Hour. A hit single of his, "Sunshine Roses", gained such popularity nationwide that RCA has signed him to a recording contract. You can be sure that more of his music will gain the same popularity.

For the weekends of November 12-13 and 19-20, the UNF Venture Theatre will be the feature attraction at UNF. This fine group of actors, under the direction of Steve Parrish, will present two plays, "The Chairs" and "The Play". All seats will be reserved and tickets must be obtained through the Department of Fine Arts.

November 19 brings us to another popular Happy Hour. On this date the Office of Student Activities will present a surprize guest, a prominent performer, in concert. Be sure not to miss this one.

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THE GREEKS ARE COMING! ZETA TAU ALPHA

Zeta Tau Alpha, an international women's sorority, has been invited to colonize on campus in October. Dates for the colonization have been set for October 8-10. The colonization will be directed by Mrs. Richard Jackson of Tallahassee, Vice President-Collegiate for the sorority. She will be assisted by Mrs. John G. Galm, Province President; Miss Joanie Kimball, National Field Secretary; Zeta collegians from the University of Florida and Jacksonville University; and local alumnae. Zeta Tau Alpha was founded at Longwood College in Farmville, Virginia in 1898. From the nine Founding sisters, two of whom are still living, Zeta has grown to over 75,000 members and this number increases annually by about 3,000. ZTA presently has the third largest number of collegiate chapters of the 26 national sororities who are members of the National Panhellenic Conference. In Florida, Zeta has chapters on the campuses of Florida State University, Stetson University, University of Florida, University of Tampa, Florida Southern, Jacksonville University, and Florida Technological University.

The Zetas have an enviable record in the field of philanthropy. In the early days of the sorority's history, ZTA maintained a Health Center to meet the needs of the mountain inhabitants of Ouurin Valley, Virginia. In 1947, the sorority turned its philanthropic efforts to the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults, Inc. (the Easter Seal Society). Zeta provided grants totaling \$50,000 for such projects as filmstrips, brochures, for parent education and child safety, and the development of self-help clothing.

Since 1970, ZTA has supported the National Association for Retarded Citizens (NARC). They have underwritten costs of brochures on prevention and guides for recreational and educational services. In addition, Zeta collegians and alumnae work in their own communities with local projects such as daycare centers, Bike-Hike, and the Special Olympics.

Established in 1954, the Zeta Tau Alpha Foundation has awarded more than \$170,000 in scholarship grants to both Zetas and non-Zetas on campuses throughout the United States and Canada.

Zeta Tau Alpha believes that belonging to a Greek group will add an enriching new dimension to campus life of the University of North Florida. Membership in Zeta Tau Alpha will offer many rewarding and unique experiences to women during their college days as well as later in their alumnae lives.

HEALTH OFFICE HINTS

Information on Swine flu immunizations:

"Flu" is a highly contagious respiratory disease caused by a virus which can periodically change. When the virus changes dramatically, as it has in the past year, a world-wide epidemic can occur. Few people's defenses are effective against the new virus. Even being young and healthy is no protection. The only defense is to have the proper antibodies against the specific virus. These antibodies will be formed in your body after immunization with the vaccine specific for that flu strain. Thus, the reason for the government's concern and haste to mass immunize the nation against the swine flu virus.

Some people are considered high risk, and they will be vaccinated first. These are the elderly and those with a chronic illness such as 1. heart disease 2. chronic lung disease—asthma, bronchitis, emphesema, T.B. 3. chronic renal disease 4. diabetes mellitus and other chronic metabolic disorders. These high risk groups will probably receive immunizations against more than one type of flu virus, for added protection.

Next, the general population will be immunized, and it is recommended that everyone be vaccinated, for their own protection and that of others. The exception is anyone with known hypersensitivity to egg protein, as the vaccine is cultured in eggs. These people will be given a skin test or other allergy-evaluating test, and any adverse reactions will indicate these people should not be vaccinated. Also, those with acute febrile illnesses will not be vaccinated until they recover.

Very few side effects can be expected. The injection site may be a little tender and reddened. Less than 2-3% of the total vaccinees may experience low grade fever, malaise, and muscle soreness for 1 or 2 days. Influenza vaccine has rarely, if ever, been associated with severe adverse reactions, thus it is considered safe for widespread use.

Local health departments and private physicians will be dispensing the vaccine. Watch the newspapers for announcement of time and place.


