The search for a new location is still underway. According to Mr. Meadows, the University now has two places particularly in mind. Currently the exact space requirements are being anticipated in time frames, so the decision can be made concerning which of the available facilities might best and most economically serve our needs.

The two places being considered should accommodate staffing and functional necessities between now and the time of the completion of the permanent campus facility to be ready in July or August of 1972. Student and faculty instructional space is not being considered as an essential requirement.

However, the case is not completely closed as the University is always receptive to benefactors.

SPEAKING OF SPEECHES

DR. ROY LASSITER made two speaking appearances recently. On May 26, he spoke to the Civitan Club and on May 30 he addressed the Annual Banquet of the Parkwood Baptist Church.

On both occasions Dr. Lassiter gave a presentation on the academic development of the University of North Florida.

Dr. Lassiter began by giving his audience an insight into the philosophy of UNF. Armed with numerous charts and slides, the task of academic programs, organization and staffing were presented with emphasis on the needs of the students, degree programs, and the organizational plan. Dr. Lassiter's concluding remarks concerned the procedure and magnitude of academically staffing the University.

Some amusing quips of Dr. Lassiter's concerned his explanation of his title, "Vice President and Dean of Faculties." As quoted from Dr. Lassiter:

"It is the job of the President to make speeches. It is the job of the faculty and students to think. It is the job of the Vice President and Dean of Faculties to see to it that the faculty and students do not make speeches and that the President does not think."

"The president is the shepherd of the University and the Vice President and Dean of Faculties is the Shepherd's crook."

On June 4, DR. THOMAS CARPENTER made an address at the Englewood High School Commencement Exercises.

Dr. Carpenter spoke to these seniors about the responsibilities and attitudes they should accept upon graduation. Using quotes from the October 10, 1847 issue of Harper's Magazine as an example, he pointed out that world problems do not change in relativity through the years. Dr. Carpenter reasoned that improving today's society can become a reality, but it should be done with responsibility and without destroying what has already been built up.

The opportunities which lay ahead for these students were also discussed by Dr. Carpenter. He stressed the idea that no matter what their plans were they should prepare themselves by always using their ability to learn.

CAMPUS VISITOR

DR. WILLIAM MALOY will be visiting the University June 9th and 10th. Dr. Maloy, arriving from Tallahassee, will be here to interview as a candidate for the position of Dean of Education.

POSTAGE PAID

A LITTLE FAULT
