



Gene Cotton



The sphere in which Gene Cotton moves has broadened considerably, both geographically and musically, since his coffeehouse circuit days. His transition from the confines of small, intimate and smoky rooms to nationwide acclaim as a highly individualized folk singer has been gradual but successful all the way. Gene is a brilliant songwriter - his original tune, "Sunshine Roses", reached national popularity even though the label was relatively unknown. It brought Gene to the attention of ABC Records, who signed him to a long term, worldwide recording contract. His first release for them, "For All The Young Writers", is his best, cer-

The singer majored in political science at Ohio State and his political views are reflected in his songs. His home life is reminiscent of the thirties, the era of depression and hoboes, for the Cottons open their hearth and home to anyone who is in need of a place to spend the night or of a meal. Gene states that more good experiences have resulted from this policy than have bad ones.

His albums show that he is not one to go along with current fads - one reviewer wrote, "Cotton strikes me as a return-or perhaps "re-emphasis" is a better word - of the protests, the messages and the very ideals of the past decade . . . maybe it's time the folksingers came back and reminded us of our apathy." And another, "Those of you who've never had the opportunity to catch Gene Cotton in concert have missed an experience - one as relaxed and informal as it is dedicated and sincere."

So, if you'd like to see the performer who upstaged Blood, Sweat and Tears when he appeared as their warm-up act in College Station, Texas, or if you simply like a really good folk singer, be there on Friday evening, November 5, for another really good Student Activities Happy Hour.


