**A**dam W. Herbert was appointed president of the University of North Florida by the Florida Board of Regents on December 5, 1988. He assumed his duties in Jacksonville on February 6, 1989.

Dr. Herbert is a native of Muskogee, Oklahoma. He earned both the Bachelor of Arts in political science and the Master of Public Administration degrees from the University of Southern California, and the Doctor of Philosophy in urban affairs and public administration from the University of Pittsburgh.

Dr. Herbert held his first faculty appointment at USC in the School of Public Administration and the Center for Urban Affairs. He also served as Coordinator for Academic Programs in the Center. In 1972, Dr. Herbert accepted an appointment at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University (Virginia Tech) as Chairman of the Urban Affairs Program in the Division of Environmental and Urban Systems.

In 1974, he was selected as one of fifteen White House Fellows, and served as Special Assistant to the U.S. Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare. Following that assignment, he worked as Special Assistant to the Under Secretary of the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Remaining in Washington after leaving government service, Dr. Herbert assumed the position of Director of Research for the Joint Center for Political Studies. He also served as adjunct professor of political science at Howard University and at USC's Washington Public Affairs Center. He subsequently renewed his affiliation with Virginia Tech as professor of public administration, and as the first director of Northern Virginia Programs for the University's Center for Public Administration and Policy.

In 1979, Dr. Herbert accepted an appointment at Florida International University, where he served as professor of public administration for almost ten years. During that time he held administrative appointments as dean of the School of Public Affairs and Services, associate vice president for academic affairs and vice president of the North Miami Campus.

Dr. Herbert has held a variety of local and national-level leadership positions in his professional field of public administration. He currently serves as chairman of the Commission on Peer Review and Accreditation, the accrediting body of the National Association of Schools of Public Affairs and Administration.

Since his appointment as UNF's President, Dr. Herbert and his wife, the former Karen Y. Lofty, have become active members of the Jacksonville community. Dr. Herbert presently serves on the boards of numerous non-profit, business and community service organizations. Mrs. Herbert is a manager with Southern Bell.



# THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH FLORIDA

The University of North Florida (UNF), one of nine institutions within the State University System of Florida, is a comprehensive urban university which offers degree programs at the baccalaureate and professional graduate levels. Established in 1965 as an upper-division and masters degree-granting institution, the University began offering classes in 1972, with 2,000 students. In 1985, freshman and sophomores were admitted for the first time.

The Florida Board of Regents appointed Thomas G. Carpenter as the first president of UNF in 1969. He was succeeded by Interim President Andrew A. Robinson, Jr. in 1980, and by UNF's second president, Curtis L. McCray in 1982. Roy E. McTarnaghan was named Interim President in 1988, and served in that role until the appointment of the University's third president, Adam W. Herbert.

The University is an accredited member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Among its professional programs, national accreditation has been achieved in the fields of business administration (undergraduate and graduate), teacher education, computer science and nursing.

UNF has been identified as one of the most selective comprehensive universities in America. In 1989-90, one of every 4.5 applicants was enrolled in the fall freshman class. Over the past five years, the mean SAT score of UNF's entering freshman class has increased by 100 points. With a mean SAT score of approximately 1070 and grade point average of approximately 3.3, UNF's 1989-90 freshman class is reflective of the University's commitment to high quality undergraduate education.

Academic programs at UNF are built on a strong foundation in the traditional arts and sciences. The University offers 45 undergraduate degree programs and 26 master's degree programs through its colleges of Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Computer and Information Sciences, Health and Education and Human Services. UNF has been authorized by the Board of Regents to plan for its first doctoral program.

Since its founding, UNF has demonstrated a continuing commitment to excellence in teaching, research and public service. The University's faculty is strongly committed to providing high-quality instruction, with particular emphasis on undergraduate education. Members of the faculty are simultaneously engaged in and produce a level of creative scholarship which demonstrates a determination

to remain at the cutting edge of intellectual inquiry and practice in their respective disciplines. Through its centers and institutes, numerous continuing education programs and staff volunteer activities, the University is a major contributor to the total life of the community, the First Coast region and the state of Florida.

The University has been strengthened significantly by the public-private partnership of which it is a proud participant. Through the strong support of the University of North Florida Foundation, Inc., and the generosity of both corporate leaders and dedicated citizens of Florida's First Coast region, UNF now has four fully funded Eminent Scholar Chairs valued at over \$4 million: the Andrew A. Robinson, Jr. Chair in Educational Policy and Economic Development; the Ira M. Koger Chair in American Music; the Prime F. Osborn Chair in Transportation and the National Paper Trade Association Endowed Research Chair in Wholesaling.

The University of North Florida currently enrolls 7,900 students. It has 296 faculty and over 1300 full-time/part-time staff. The total 1989-90 UNF budget exceeds \$40 million.

## ACADEMIC REGALIA

Academic regalia dates back to European universities in the Middle Ages, when gowns and hoods were required for warmth in unheated buildings. Gowns were fur-lined adaptations of the priestly toga, and hoods were worn to protect the tonsured head of the priest. The regalia now serve as a visible reminder of the historic antecedents of intellectual pursuits.

In American universities of the late nineteenth century, these medieval costumes were revived to lend color to academic functions. Efforts were made to establish a code that would set standards for academic regalia. Gowns of masters and doctors are generally ankle length and closed in front. The master's gown has pointed sleeves that are slit at the elbows. The doctor's gown has wide lapels of velvet, either black or the color of the scholar's specialization. The sleeves are full and bell-shaped, with three velvet chevrons, either black or colored like the lapels. Gowns are normally black, although some universities have designed their own color of the institution.

The hood, which drapes over the back of the gown, carries the greatest symbolism of all components of the academic costume. Its length, width and the color or trim, and the color or colors of the lining denote the wearer's highest academic achievement. The master's hood is pointed; the doctor's hood is bell-shaped. The color of the border of the hood indicates the scholar's major field of study; the lining color (or colors) identifies the institution that conferred the wearer's degree. Hoods were originally trimmed in fur, but now have satin borders for masters and velvet for doctors.

The customary head covering is the mortarboard, or Oxford cap, with a tassel on the left side. Those who possess the doctor's degree wear a tassel of gold metallic threads. The soft, large beret, modeled after the cap of Cambridge University, has also been adopted by some institutions.

The medieval university was much concerned with rank and privilege, and academic robes made visible the social and academic distinctions of the wearers. These distinctions have largely disappeared, and robes indicate specialization. The following colors are associated with the degrees frequently represented in academic processions:
