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

VENTURE THEATRE

Venture Theatre at the University of North Florida will present Theatre of the Absurd November 12, 13, 19 and 20 at 8:00 p.m. in the campus assembly hall. Samuel Beckett's "Play" and Eugene Ionesco's "The Chairs" make up the program which will be presented free to the public.

Directed by Mary Brumbaugh, "Play" explores the responses of three people trapped in an unknown environment where they are under the control of a beam of light. "The Chairs," directed by Stephen Parrish, portrays two old people on an island where they are isolated not only from the world but from themselves and each other as well. Both plays are clear and powerful examples of theatre of the absurd as developed by such significant playwrites as Beckett and lonesco. Like the broader existential philosophy that informs theatre of the absurd, both playwrites are concerned with the absurdity of human existence and the struggle to give meaning to individual lives.

The cast for "Play" includes Ty Anderson, John Culson Boles, Cathy Clifford and Conni Rayl. Appearing in "The Chairs" are Bill Bennett, Dean Chateauneuf and Meredith Normington. The production is sponsored by the UNF Council of the Arts and Student Activities and produced by Dr. Jane Decker. MCCABE AND MRS. MILLER December 3


Credit Robert Altman's genius for this compelling, authentic portrait of the 1902 zinc mining town called Presbyterian Church (named for the tallest building in town). Credit the muted ambiance of hazy, smoky air; the bone-chilling blizzard; the haunting refrains of Leonard Cohen's ballad for recreating with startling accuracy the frontier myth of America's past. This is what the West was like, primitive, miserable, violent and full of despair.
