### A GIFT OF BLOOD FOR CHRISTMAS

In an attempt to reach the University goal of 50 pints of blood donated in the Dec. 13, Jacksonville Blood Bank Mobile Unit visit, the University of North Florida staff will compete in teams.

All employees' names will be placed in a "hat" for the drawing of eight teams. The teams will be named after Santa's famous reindeer, in keeping with the holiday season. The team donating the most blood to the campaign will receive a plaque, which will go on permanent display, showing the community spirit of the UNF family.

Anyone wishing to have his or her name omitted from the drawing should contact Joyce Reynolds in the College of Education before the drawing on Tuesday morning (Dec. 7).

Team lists will be posted on the bulletin board Wednesday (Dec. 8), with donation sign-up sheets. Team members may sign up Dec. 8, 9 and 10. The winning team will be announced Tuesday (Dec. 14).

If the total 50 pints is collected, the University will receive an award plaque from the Jacksonville Blood Bank.

This reserve of blood could someday be needed by a member of the staff. It could be you. Give a pint, Monday, Dec. 13.

### LIBRARY APPROVED AS SELECTIVE DEPOSITORY

Word reached the UNF library last week from Congressman Charles E. Bennett and Senator Edward Gurney, that the University library has successfully become a senatorial designated Selective Depository for Federal documents.

Thanks to Congressman Claude Pepper of Miami and Senator Gurney, the library was able to obtain a transfer in depository designations with the Miami Public Library. Papers from the Government Printing Office will make it official.

Significant to the University of North Florida, this designation allows the library to select and receive almost all of needed Federal documents without cost.

The library expresses a special thanks to Congressman Bennett and his staff for working with them in obtaining the Selective Depository library status.
