On December 16, 1972 a disastrous earthquake hit Managua, Nicaragua, the tremors of which shook the world. Out of approximately 300,000 residents of the city, 10,000 have died or are seriously injured, not to mention the thousands that are homeless and starving.

President Anastasia Somoza has done a good job of evacuating the city of all residents and setting up tents and medical facilities on the outskirts of Managua to avoid a feared epidemic of typhoid and cholera. To avoid this epidemec, however, blood plasma and drugs are desperately needed.

In spite of this need, the federal government has not yet called upon the city and state blood banks to assist in this dire matter.

Although plasma and blood are on the top of the list of the most wanted items in Managua flashlights, batteries, canned goods and clothing are also needed.

If you haven't made it a point to stop by the bookstore, you ought to drop in and say hello...you'll be glad you did.

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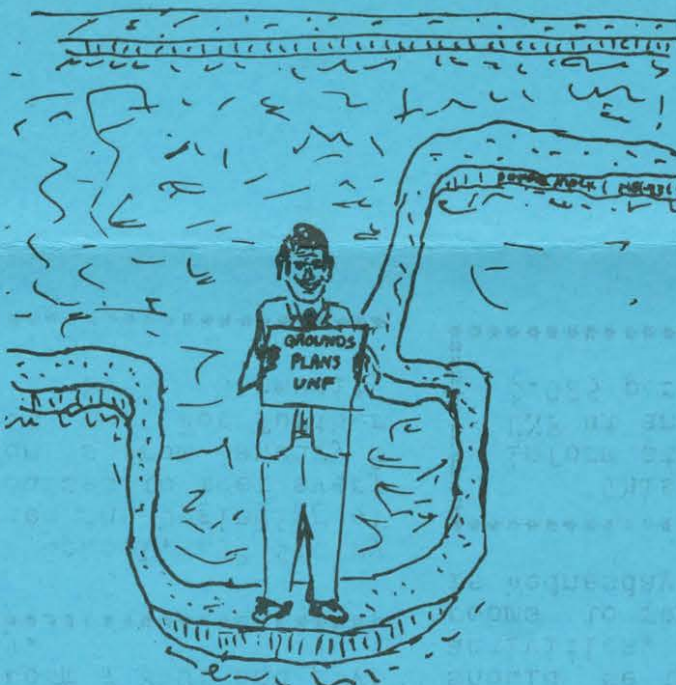
## 'PEARLS' FROM AUNT DENISE
