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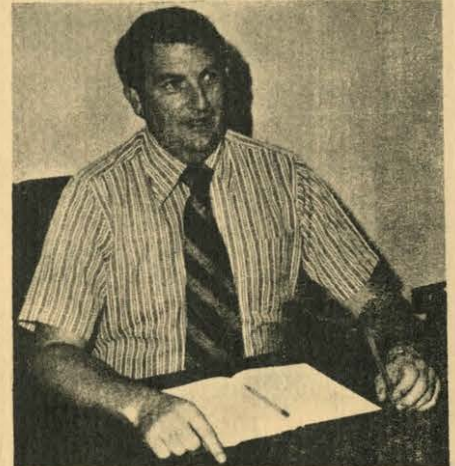
Message From The Dean

New Complex Opens in '79

The new Student Activities and Conference Center for the University of North Florida campus is scheduled to open by 1979, according to Dr. Thomas G. Carpenter, president of UNF.

The total cost of the facility has been estimated at \$5 million for which \$3.5 million has already been allocated.

The activities center will house a new cafeteria containing two main dining rooms and a large lounge area. The outside dining areas will overlook Candy Cane Lake.

The complex will include a new Student Activities Office, an intramurals office, two meeting rooms and two lounging areas.

The new game rooms will give students another recreational area for such favorite pastime activities as ping-pong, pool, pinball and foosball.

Another section of the game room will encompass a seven foot television screen and a separate music listening room.

The central structure of the building will be the auditorium which is being designed to accommodate dramatic productions, musical performances, motion pictures, lectures, convocations and general assemblies. It will have a seating capacity of about 700 which can be divided into three sections by a unique arrangement consisting of two 150-seat "turntables" or rotation lecture halls, said Carpenter.

Carpenter said the center will provide an ideal environment for a wide variety of conferences, short courses and other appropriate meetings involving the university, businesses, various governments, civic organizations and other groups whose presence promotes the objectives of the university.

New Forensics Winner

The Florida Crown Individual Events Forensics Classic, held on the UNF campus Dec. 3 — 4, was a tremendous success. Competitors from 12 colleges (two from out of state) participated in the tournament.

The awards presentation ceremony reflected the obvious enthusiasm of the participants — the announcement of each winner prompted cheers and applause.

It was UNF's turn when Jackie White was announced as the fourth place winner in the finals of the Impromptu Speaking event, a win which qualified Jackie for participation in the national tournament to be held in April.

This tournament was a first for UNF, and forensics Coach Ozzie Banicki says the unqualified success of the tournament will undoubtedly promote UNF as a host school for future events.

—Letter grades are assigned for all courses on a scale from A through F with an I meaning the course hasn't been completed and, with prior consent from the instructor, the student has extended time in which to complete it.

—The numeric coding which precedes courses means:

The Bookstore offers a typing service, and a list of typists is kept current on the bulletin board of the Cooperative Education and Placement Office.

—Most bulletin boards are reserved for the posting of campus activities and other relevant material. The board on the left at the main entrance (the circular drive) is an open board, however.

Changes Veterans Should Know

The Veterans Education and Employment Assistance Act of 1976 was passed by Congress Oct. 1, 1976. The new law includes the following:

It extends the basic 36 month entitlement to 45 months regardless of program.

—Increases educational assistance and subsistence allowance approximately 8 per cent for all programs except the flight program.

—Extends the basic 36 month entitlement to 45 months regardless of program. It does not limit the veteran to pursuit of a standard undergraduate college degree.

—increases tutorial assistance to \$65 per month and the maximum to \$780.

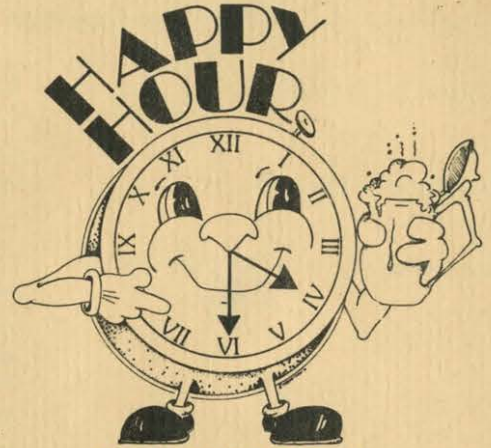

Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore

This wry comedy-drama may well be the best motion picture ever made about a woman. With compassion and disarming realism, it follows the difficult odyssey of Alice as she struggles to build a new life; she is widowed and with a 12-year-old son, no job and no money.

Ellyn Burstyn's award winning performance soars in an ever-ascending spiral to new heights of artistry. Kris Kristofferson, as comfortable as warm earth, plays the first decent man in her life and the rest of the cast couldn't be bettered: Diane Ladd as a brassy hash-house waitress with a heart of gold; Alfred Lutter as Alice's son, cynically wise beyond his years; and Harvey Keitel as the lover whose boyish charm turns to sadism.
