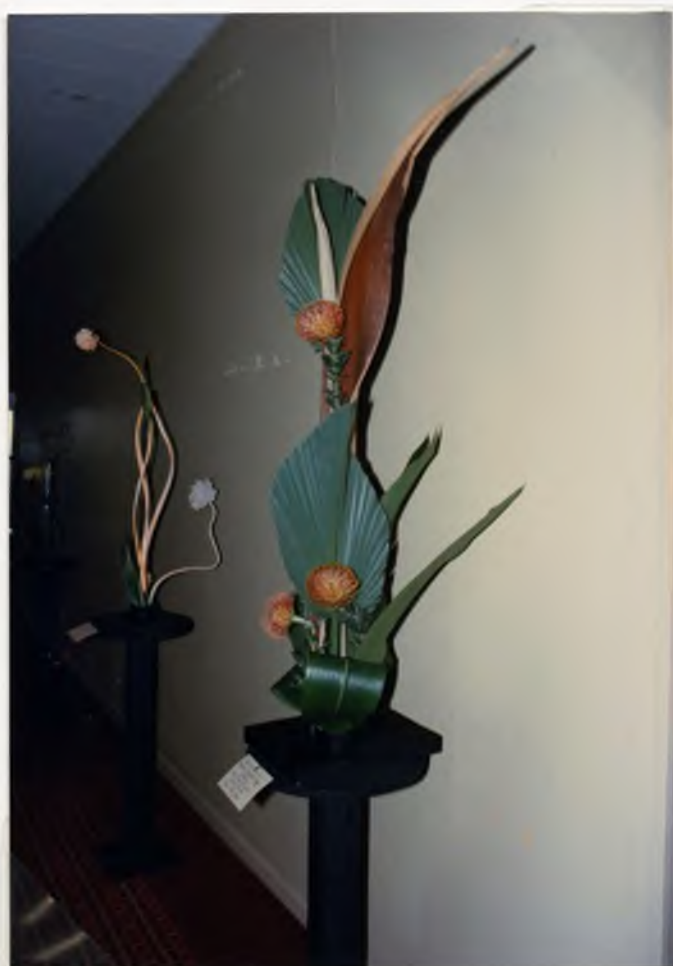

# TREES:

## Right-of-way planting begins

A joint project of the Mandarin Community Club and Garden Club has resulted in several additional trees being planted along the area's right-of-ways.

The goal of the tree-planting project is to "replace some of the trees which have been lost to developers," said Mary Ann Southwell, immediate past president of the Mandarin Community Club and one of the organizers of the current project.

The project itself is actually under the auspices of Ken and Dottie Campeljohn, who are coordinating the planting and fundraising.

The couple is seeking suggestions for

right-of-way locations where trees would be suitable and would thrive, Southwell said.

Four oak trees were planted this month along Mandarin Road and two dogwoods were placed in front of the cemetery.

Funding for the ongoing project began last year, but this month was the first chance the clubs had to actually plant the trees.

A private individual who learned of the project and said she was angered by the felling of trees in Mandarin donated \$500, Southwell said.
