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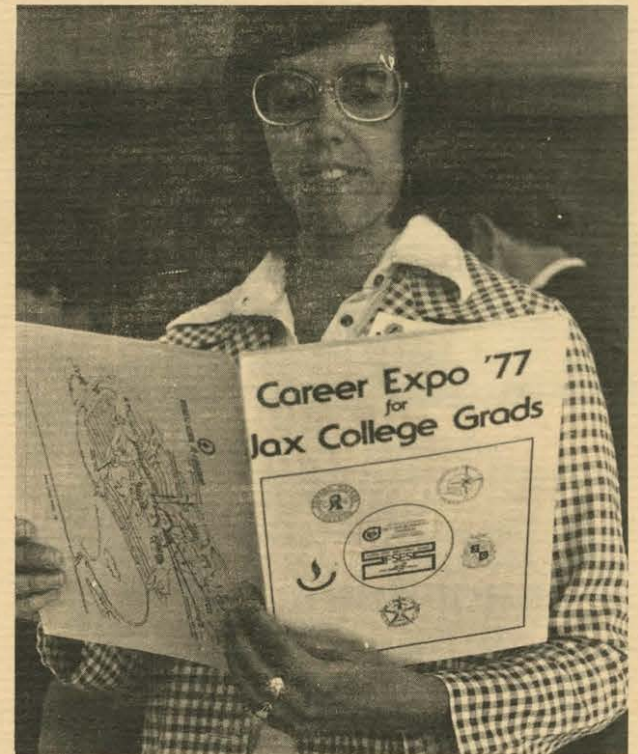
## CAREER EXPO '77 DRAWS STUDENTS FROM FIVE CAMPUSES

The graduates of Edward Waters College, Florida Junior College, Jacksonville University, Jones College and the University of North Florida had the opportunity to meet many of Jacksonville's major employers at one place and time recently at the Career Expo '77 event. The event, which was held May 5 and 6, was co-sponsored by the Jacksonville Area Chamber of Commerce and the Florida State Employment Service. Carol Ann Boyles, UNF's Director of Cooperative Education and Placement, was responsible for making the facilities of UNF available and for coordinating the program.

Present at Expo '77 were 35 employers who had employment positions available. These employers did not regard this as a get-acquainted meeting, but an event for employers in need of top quality personnel and for students and graduates looking for career to make the right connections.

Expo '77 was attended by 398 graduates who arranged for 321 on-campus interviews. In addition, the students and graduates had the opportunity to meet informally with company representatives at tables across the campus. This provided a contact for both groups which will have benefits for an extended period of time. Fifteen employers will participate in UNF's Resume Referral Service, others have expressed a desire to be present at Career Expo '78, with some employers stating they were definitely going to make job offers to specific graduates. Consensus was that Expo '77 was a great idea and that solid benefits would result. The event was covered by Channel 12 TV.

Coop and Placement personnel will follow up on the results of the Expo in 30 days to determine the actual number of graduates who were offered jobs and later to determine how many were hired as a result of Career Expo '77.



The success of the event marks the probable establishment of another UNF tradition. With the same high quality planning and organization demonstrated this year the projections for Expo '78 have great promise. Career Expo can help to bring career fulfillment to Jacksonville's college students. Our appreciation to Carol Ann Boyles.

## ROTC OPPORTUNITY

The following information is from the ROTC office—if interested contact Captain McDowell at 646-2813:

There is still time to enroll in ROTC if—

You have at least five more quarters at UNF at either graduate or undergraduate level or combination thereof.

You will be less than 33 years of age upon completion of those five remaining quarters.

As a veteran you may be eligible to enroll in the advanced program this fall.

The same applies if you already have two years of the basic program or three years of junior ROTC in high school.

OR, you can enroll this summer in our four-credit hour intensified course (MIS 300) to be eligible for the advanced course.

Once you qualify you will earn \$100.00 a month for up to 20 months.

Upon completion of ROTC you will be commissioned a second lieutenant in the United States Army.



## NOTES TO VETERANS

We are reprinting the following from a former issue because of its current relevance to students in the VA program...

Recent changes in V.A. Regulations have, among other things, created the provision that withdrawal from a course may result in the veteran having to repay monies received for attending that course.

The V.A. is also refusing to pay for courses previously completed with a passing grade or for courses not within the veteran's approved program of study.

Summer registration for current students is approaching. In light of the above mentioned changes, veterans apprehensive about their proposed enrollment should contact their academic advisor and the University's Office of Veterans Affairs before committing themselves.

May will be the last month that the V.A. will send checks out on the first of the month for that month. You will receive your June check on July 1. There will be a 61 day period between your May and June checks. Plan Ahead! Your July check will be delivered on Aug. 1.
