Musical Group to Perform

The off-Broadway hit musical "Journey into Blackness" will be performed by the repertory company Voices at the Civic Auditorium Tuesday March 16, at 8:30 pm. This performance is sponsored by a federal grant to the University of North Florida and Edward Waters College, distributed through the Fine Arts Council of Florida, a state agency. The UNF Office of Student Activities is also helping sponsor the event.

The musical was highly praised by New York Times chief critic Clive Barnes during its New York run, which was almost a year. The production was the subject of a CBS-TV special. RCA Victor has produced an original cast album and there has been a national college tour by the William Morris Agency.

"Journey into Blackness" uses song, dance, drama and narrative to depict the sights, sounds and inner feelings of Black Americans past and present. Complimentary tickets are available to UNF students at the Office of Student Activities.

Relamation Through Transcendental Meditation

To be able to think more clearly, to speak more effectively, to act with more energy and creativity, and to enjoy life more. Such improvements in daily living are said to be the results of a natural, easy mental technique called transcendental meditation (or TM).

There will be two lectures on March 1. The first will be between the hours of 2:00-3:00, and the second from 8:00-9:00. Both will be in building 003, room #1381. On March 2, another lecture will be held from 7:30-8:30 at the same location. All are invited to attend.

John and Judy Finkle, of the Students' International Meditation Society (SIMS), will be giving the lecture. John says TM is not a philosophy or religion, but is a systematic, scientifically verifiable technique which unfolds each person's full potential. It is as ancient as mankind and is universal in its application.

John says that it is simple and easy to learn because it is so natural and that it will help every person fulfill his aspirations in life, be they to get better grades, to work more efficiently and with less effort, or to simply enjoy life more. Better personal relationships, increased ability to deal with problems and meet responsibilities, more inner peace, and better mental and physical health are all said to be results of this simple technique.

John Finkle has stated that a recent scientific investigation at UCLA, Stanford Research Institute, and Harvard Medical School has shown, among other things, that during TM the body receives profound relaxation and rest and is remarkably free from tension. The metabolic rate and biochemical indications of anxiety decrease considerably. The body gains a state of rest deeper than the rest of deep sleep in just 20 minutes of TM, yet the mind, as recorded by the electroencephalograph, is fully awake.

The Illinois House of Representatives has passed a resolution encouraging that state's educational institutions consider offering courses in TM and creative intelligence. Everyone is invited to the lectures on campus. See for yourself what TM can do for you.

Kranzs Class Hears Speaker

Thursday, February 15, 1973. What kind of day was it? A day like all others except for the undercurrent feeling of excitement, curiosity, and suspense awaiting the appearance of Michel X. The minister of the Muslim Mosque of Jacksonville and a representative of the Honorable Elijah Muhammad, was a guest speaker for Dr. Peter Kranz's "Black and White Conflict"

Rev. Michel X expressed the religious philosophies of the Nation of Islam, commonly called the Black Muslims. Following the lecture was a class discussion in which very divergent opinions were expressed in response to the speaker's remarks.

Photography to be on Exhibit

The photographic collection will open in the University of North Florida Library Friday, March 2. The exhibit may be viewed in the library lobby diring the regular library hours through March 16.

The tour offers an opportunity for thousands of Black youth to know the Black man who is James Van DerZee.

The pieces included in the exhibition represent one man's personal relationship with the people and the world around him.

James Van DerZee's love for his craft/art has resulted in a visual record of life in and around Harlem from the turn of the century to the present. His work brings an added dimension to

the study of Black History.

This series of exhibitions is free of charge to participating schools and is made possible by a grant from the Beefeater Foundation. The foundation supports specific cultural activities and recognized singular artistic achievement. The foundation considers the work of James Van DerZee of particular significance and is making his art available, for the first time, to a national audience.

The first of the series was held at the Folk Gallery, Syracuse University, Syracuse, New York. UNF is fortunate to be able to bring such an ex-

hibit to its community.
