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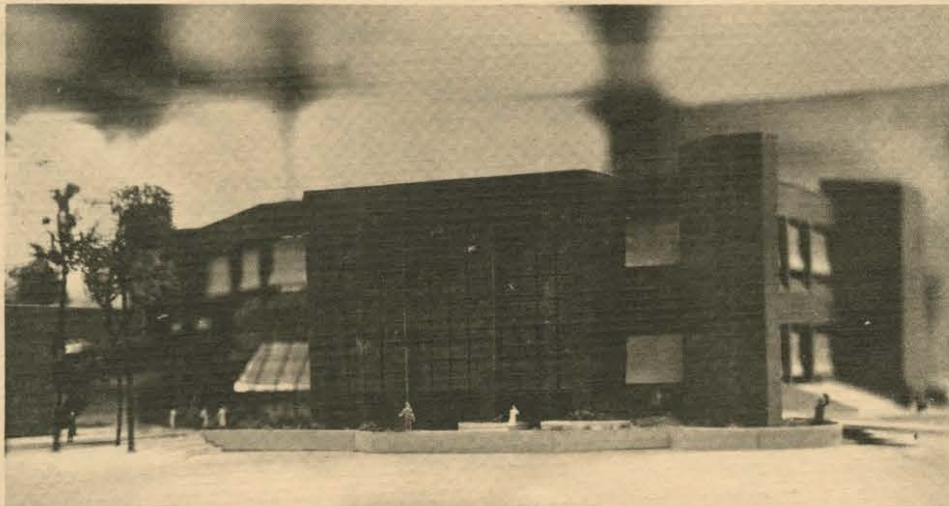
## NEW LIBRARY

UNF's new library is past the dreaming stage, though it is a librarians dream. The new building began with one purpose in mind—to be the best designed library facility possible, and to have the expansion capability to meet UNF's need for a long, long time.

The 4.8 million dollar four-storied structure is projected to open in 1979, after some 15 months of construction, and will include a reconfiguration of the lake behind the present library. A model is on view in the library lobby, which looks good.

An evident need for more class rooms and offices by the 1980's made this expansion the obvious next construction for our growing campus. The present library facility will be converted into those needed offices and class rooms; it is well suited for this use.

The new library is designed with the student in mind, and will offer more conveniences than the present one. Among these will be a drive-up book drop, lounges, typing rooms, and lots of copy machines. It will be an attractive place in which to visit, study, and work. There will even be a pleasant outdoor lounge overlooking the new lake. Very nice.

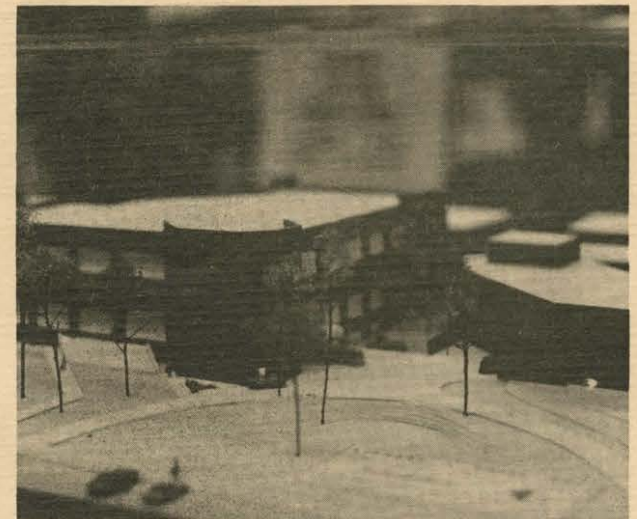


Architect's model.

The new building will be larger than the present facility, with 50% more space, and a capability to house easily the collection which normally grows at the rate of about 20,000 volumes per year. In fact, the new library is expected to hold 700 to 750 thousand volumes comfortably, while the present one would be packed with 500 thousand or so.

The new library will be built with an ability to convert to the wonders of the future too. One day the necessity of all library cards will be eliminated, and that's just the beginning. We will be able to check on the availability of a book without even going to the library. Computer terminals in

various buildings will allow a student or faculty member to type in the pertinent information and not only learn if the book is in the collection, but will have it put on hold if

desired. One day, in order to research a topic, all one need do will be to type the request at one of these terminals, and watch a search be made by the computer; it will search the entire nation for the facts. The computer will then display all information requested. Research papers will not only be quicker, but much more accurate and complete. These wonders sound like the distant future, but they are available now. When funding is available for them, the new library will be ready and able to implement them.

Though our new library is expected to be adequate for a long time, eventually it will have to grow too. It is good to know that even this has been considered and planned for by the originators of its design. Good planning makes a fine library. We look forward to its completion.

# UNF Vice President Resigns To Accept Challenging Tennessee Post

Dr. Roy Lassiter has resigned his position as vice president and dean of Faculties at UNF to fill a Tennessee state post as the Executive Vice Chancellor of the State University and Community College System of Tennessee.

The Tennessee Board of Regents unanimously approved the appointment of Lassiter during a called session in Nashville

recently. He will assume the position in July. As Executive Vice Chancellor, Lassiter will serve as acting chancellor in the chancellor's absence, serve as chief of the 40-member Tennessee board staff to coordinate long-range planning, management resource studies and capital needs evaluation, and as the system's affirmative action officer.

The State University and Community College System of Tennessee is comprised of six universities and 10 community colleges enrolling more than 84,000 students. The system, created by the state legislature five years ago, is ranked ninth in the nation, and is continuing to develop and expand.

Tennessee Chancellor Roy S. Nicks stated "Dr. Lassiter's strong academic and fiscal background will be of great assistance in building stronger quality programs and more effective management systems throughout the system. His commitment to affirmative action, as demonstrated by his actions in staffing the University of North Florida and his numerous publications in this area, will certainly strengthen our system and campus affirmative action programs. I am confident that Dr. Lassiter's coming to Tennessee will have a positive overall impact on Tennessee higher education administration." Lassiter earned a Bachelor of Science in Agriculture with honors and a Doctor of Philosophy in economics, agricultural economics and

statistics at the University of Florida. He has served as president of the Florida Association of Colleges and Universities, a member of the board of trustees and vice-president of the Jacksonville Hospitals Educational Program, Inc., a member of the Governor's Council on Criminal Justice, a member of the Governor's Criminal Justice Advisory Council and a member of the board of directors of the Florida Baptist Convention, Inc. He was selected by the Human Relations Commission of the Consolidated City of Jacksonville to receive the 1974-75 individual award for development and direction of UNF's "outstanding affirmative action program."

Lassiter is author or co-author of numerous publications and articles. He served in the U.S. Coast Guard during WWII and as a commissioned officer in the U.S. Army during the Korean conflict; he is a retired Lt. Colonel in the Army Reserve.

Lassiter commented on his appointment to Tennessee; "After more than seven years of involvement in the planning, staffing, development and operations of the University of North Florida, a decision to leave is not easily made. The associations with the faculty and staff of the University have been among the most enjoyable and beneficial in my experience. I am grateful for the opportunities to have served this institution. The position which has been offered to me in Tennessee promises signi-

ficant professional and personal fulfillment."

UNF's President Thomas G. Carpenter has requested Dr. William L. Wharton, associate dean of faculties, to assist Dr. Lassiter in preparations for the transition, while procedures are made to find a successor for Lassiter.

The above information was taken from a special issue of the Mariner, the UNF staff publication and we at the Campus UPDATE would like to add our own thoughts and appreciation, and a personal note.

UNF is losing one of its finest assets when Dr. Lassiter leaves the campus at the end of June. He has concluded his tenure at this University on a high note of achievement, having worked hard and in harmony with Dr. Carpenter and the other initiators of this institution to make it an integral and important part of the Jacksonville community.

The decision as to his successor will not be an easy one for the person who 'steps into his boots' will have trouble adjusting them so that they fit comfortably. Helping to 'build' UNF was a challenge to Dr. Lassiter—he is accepting another in his new position.

His talent, experience and hard-working ability, we are sure, will contribute to the further success of the Tennessee State University System. Our best wishes go with you, Dr. Lassiter—you will be missed.

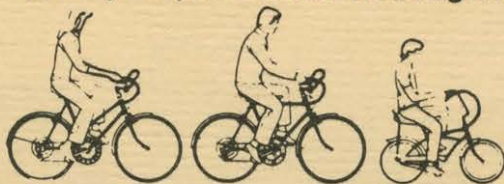

What will this summer be for you? More school? Work? Just another dull hot spell? Or are you among the lucky ones who are doing something worth doing this year?

First of all, UNF's tuition is reduced considerably, so this is a good summer to pick up those credits you need at a bargain rate. Not a bad ideal Many of us will do just that.

Others though, are heading for distant parts and new experiences. And, by distant, we don't mean Palatka! We mean Chile, Peru, The Netherlands, Colombia, Israel, Italy, and such. And these Venturers are not going just for the trip. They will get College Credit, with knowledge and understanding of others thrown in free.

For instance, students in good standing in the State University System are eligible to spend six months or a year studying in Israel in a fully approved curriculum at Haifa University with the option of transferring to Tel Aviv or Hebrew University in Jerusalem. An intensive Hebrew language course has been developed especially for foreign students for which they will receive 12 quarter hours of credit. After a short vacation the students may choose from a large selection of courses, all offered in English.

Dr. Barry Mesch, Associate Professor of Religion at the University of Florida and Director of the Center for Jewish Studies, will make the trip and reside with his family in Israel to act as Resident Advisor and friend to the lucky students who are going there.

If this side of the Atlantic is more interesting to you, how about studying Spanish in Colombia? The University of Florida, through the Center for Latin American Studies, offers a six-week intensive Spanish course every summer at the Universidad de los Andes in Bogota, Colombia.

Students receive six weeks of intensive language instruction by Colombian teachers at one of Latin America's leading private universities, with nine quarter hours of credit for their efforts. They will live with Colombian families and enjoy the opportu-

ity to explore the Country. Not your average summer, that's for sure.

If you are really into the overseas experience, try this: Study in the Netherlands, for a year. The Florida Utrecht Exchange Program for 1977-78 includes some 20 lucky students.

The University of Utrecht is located in Utrecht, a city of 300,000, located 20 miles from Amsterdam. The university, founded in 1636, has 20,000 students.

American students will receive an intensive Dutch Language course for the entire Fall Quarter, with 15 quarter hours credit resulting. Then, in the Winter Quarter, they will work in the appropriate University of Utrecht Institute (department) from January to June '78. Most lectures and seminars are conducted in Dutch, though all papers and exams may be written in English. High rise student dormitories are available, or if desired, housing can be arranged with Dutch families.

Students have been selected for this experience on the basis of their academic standing, maturity, and other factors. The University of Utrecht is sending a delegation of graduate students to the University of Florida as their part of the exchange. Both the Netherlands and the States have good reason to expect better mutual understanding from these exchanges.

The summer of '77 will be different things to different people, but there are many Florida students who will have a summer that will never be forgotten. We wish them Bon Voyage!

### FROM SKILLS CENTER

Good News! The Academic Enrichment and Skills Center has been awarded a Title VIA Equipment and Materials Grant. This award enables the Center to update the Reading Lab equipment, replacing the old controlled readers with the new Comb-8's. It is not atypical to increase one's reading rate as much as 300 words per minute without a loss in comprehension. The new

equipment will make this process even more enjoyable. Additional resources will also be added to the math and writing labs. Come share our new goodies.

"I wish I had known about this place earlier," is a comment frequently heard in the Academic Enrichment and Skills Center. We do try to spread the message that we're here and we *like* to help.

The Center is funded by students, for students. Free tutoring is available in math, statistics, education, psychology, accounting, writing, reading, study skills, and other areas.

## GLAUCOMA SCREENING TO BE OFFERED

Tuesday, June 28th, the Lions Club of Jacksonville will be offering a free Glaucoma Screening at the Health Office from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Glaucoma is a disease of the eye which is characterized by increased intraocular pressure and impaired vision. This pressure change can be detected by

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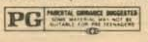
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**HAPPY FACE SAYS—**
