Dear Elizabeth: -

I thank you very much for the joint letter of mother and yourself of the 17<sup>th</sup> and the one to Aunt Till of the 18<sup>th</sup> and <sup>we both</sup> are glad of father's slight improvement and hope and pray he will soon entirely throw off the fever & continue on the road to a rapid and complete recovery.

Frank left for Chicago last night and should reach there in the morning. Why is it that at 6 P.M. I have received no wire to day regarding father's condition, a wire should be sent each day.

An old man came into the office Saturday claiming to be a confederate soldier and asked me to look for his name in a book entitled soldiers which contains an incomplete list of the soldiers who were in the Confederate



Army, his name did not appear, and he told me that he had put in an application to the state for a pension which had been disapproved, stating that he was a deserter, which of course was one of the reasons his name did not appear on the rolls.

What with working in the office all day teaching school from 7.30 to 9.30 P.M. and reading up on various histories & writing and revising an address until 12 or 1 A.M. life is quite strenuous.

Saw Robin Adair the smoke house man this afternoon and he asked very particularly about you all and sends his kindest regards.

I am preparing an ode to Cooper Gibbs to be used at a supper party given him by a number of his friends only one verse so far and it may never be completed.

Love to you all and may the dear God bless and keep you and restore father to health and strength.
