Friday night.

Dear "Miss Fleming":

Your sweet letter came via Waynesville, and tho' you have gotten my letter written last Friday or Saturday ere this, will drop you a line to let you know all's well. Indeed I was proud to get your note & you've been a brick about writing this summer.

Don't know how you & Dick got the idea I'd relapsed. It's true I've not gotten really well yet & have had a deal of trouble with that refractory tonsil, but still I'm a different man from what I was 3 weeks ago. Have stopped over here to see a good Dr. before going home, the Waynesville M. D. having advised me to stay away from Ga. until November. This I did not want to do & so decided to come this far south and get advice. Dr. Hull whom I saw today says I've still malaria, but not much & my throat is not serious tho' tiresome. So,

I think he will let me go home next week where of I'm duly glad.

I am certainly distressed to hear of your father's sickness & don't like to think of you and your mother being off there by yourselves with all of the anxiety & responsibility to face, so far away from home. Have you any friends there at all? Well it's a slow job getting well from such an illness as his was & you will have to make use of some more of your patience which has had so many calls upon it.

Now please, please when I get back to Jax. if there is anything I can do or undo for you or your mother just tell me & see how much pleasure I'll take in the job.

Saw Addison in Waynesville & he & Miss Marie & Miss Sanders came out to call on me last Sunday. His little brother is down with typhoid & he was expecting to leave the same day as Gilbert & I did.

He stopped over in Fallulah Falls on the way down & I sent you a souvenir card from there which showed only wretchedly

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one of the smaller falls. Picture four cascades in the space of $\frac{1}{2}$ mile, making a fall of several hundred feet, enclosed in a chasm of sheer naked granite from 800 to 1200 feet deep. It's the most awe-inspiring sight I ever witnessed.

I'd hoped that maybe I'd slip away on in October & find you in N. Y., as you come back for a few days but I've been away so long now that I feel I must go back, get to work & try to make some money.

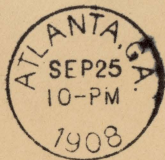
Good-night lady, and here's hoping for some good news of you in your next letter, which you can address to Jacksonville. If I'm not there will have it forwarded.

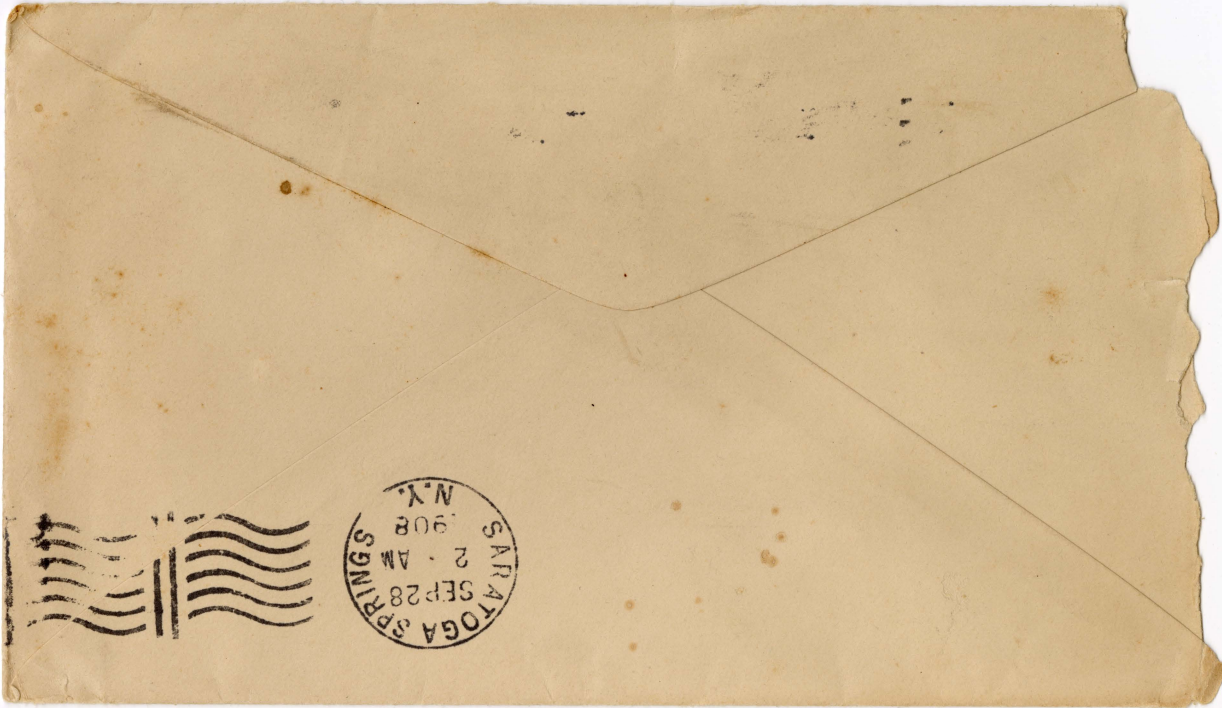
