### MERIT RAISES MAY BE RETROACTIVE

Career service, faculty and administrative and professional personnel may receive retroactive salary increases as a result of the recent decisions of the Wage Board on Phase II of the Wage-Price Freeze.

The Chancellor of the University system and the director of the State Division of Personnel and Retirement have written separate letters to the Jacksonville office of the Internal Revenue Service requesting approval.

Approval has not been received, but if you were eligible for a yearly salary increase during Phase I of the Wage-Price Freeze (Aug. 15 - Nov. 14) you may be entitled to payment for the amount which you would have received if the Freeze had not been implemented.

You will be notified when news is received from Tallahassee.
