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## UNF to Present Varied Concert

The University of North Florida Fine Arts Department will present a special concert of music at St. Paul's By The Sea Episcopal Church, Jacksonville Beach, on Sunday, May 27 at 4:00 P.M. The program, open to the public without charge, is entitled "In memoriam" and is dedicated to the memory of those who died in Southeast Asia.

The program will feature three UNF faculty members: William Brown, nationally known operatic and concert tenor; Arthur Bloomer, brilliant concert organist; and Jack Funkhouser, who will direct the orchestra and the UNF chorus. Also participating in the program will be Sharon Wright, soprano and UNF music major; and John Hein, baritone and UNF librarian.

The program will begin with Mozart's Sonata in C Major for organ and strings and will continue with the anthem "There Shall Be No More Night There," composed by Wood and sung by Professor Brown.

The UNF chorus will then be heard in Fauré's Requiem and J.S. Bach's Chorale "Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring."

Special guest and consultant for the program will be Stewart Knussen, for several years the principal double bass and the Chairman of the London Symphony Orchestra. Mr. Knussen is presently General Manager of the Baltimore Symphony.

This concert has been made possible by the support of the UNF Office of Student Activities.

## Students to Attend Festival

Some UNF art students will be participating in "powers-under-the-oaks," an arts, crafts, and heritage festival, which will be held Memorial Day Weekend, May 26-28, at Jekyll Island, Georgia. The three-day festival will feature artists and craftsmen of all kinds and a special heritage section, which will include ecology booths and things of historical interest.

The festival will be held on the river side of the island next to the Gould Auditorium near the old Jekyll Hotel. The site is a lovely grass-covered area with many oaks and pines. The booths will be interspersed among the trees and will be constructed mainly of old-weathered wood to give the festival a rustic atmosphere.

There will be over 100 different exhibits. These range from painters, sculptors, woodcarvers, potters, macramers, batikers, photographers, leatherworkers, and jewelry-makers to the Georgia Conservancy and the Beehive Press exhibits. There will also be plenty of things to eat. People are urged to feel free to talk with the artists and craftsmen and to buy some of the many things on sale.

The festival is being sponsored by three young women with help from their families. It is their aim to promote arts and crafts in the coastal region and to help the many organizations that are working for conservation and preservation of the region's natural and historical resources.

The festival will be Sat., Sun., and Mon., May 26-28. Gates will open at 10 A.M. and close at 6 P.M. The admission is \$1 for adults and 50¢ for children. Come join us in a time of joy, celebration, sunshine, and fun.

# UNF-Sponsored Urban Critic Reviews Jax

UNF recently sponsored a lecture and forum on the question, "Can We Humanize Our Cities?" The event involved seven community organizations, including Channel 7, Jones College Radio, Edward Waters College, Jacksonville University, and Florida Junior College and UNF faculty directing the effort.

UNF faculty and students played key roles in the creation of the spectacle, which was aired by Channel 7 later in the week for Jacksonville homeviewers.

Photography by Duncan Rosborough, student; a multi-media show by Dr. Jane Decker; musical accompaniment by Dr. Gerson Yessin; the speaker introduction by President Thomas G. Carpenter; and moderating the Forum event by Dr. George Corrick all blended for a splendid success.

Others who made the evening possible were Grant Director, Dr. Gerson Yessin, Grant Secretary Dr. Gary L. Harmon, Dr. Jane Decker and Dr. Richard Bizot, UNF Coordinators; Charles Charles in charge of Art Exhibit.

The grant from the Florida's Citizen's Committee for the Humanities and the National Endowment for the Humanities, which gave special grants to communities which could carry out significant projects that featured in-depth explorations of social issues through the arts and humanities.

Allen Tenko, internationally-known urban historian and architectural critic from San Francisco, developed his talk on cities by focusing on Jacksonville. He outlined some nightmare aspects of our present Jacksonville, as well as projecting goals and ideals for our urban planners and Jacksonville citizens to consider seriously.

Mr. Tenko singled out the campus of UNF as one of Jacksonville's nightmares. "Set in the Pouteria "it may be an 'environmental dream,' but to Mr. Tenko at least, a university should be interwoven with human involvement". He described cities where senior citizens and students share not only buildings but each other's needs. He further described the downtown of Jacksonville as "the hole in the urban doughnut."

The members of the panel, Robert Broward, A.I.A.; Charles Charles; J.J. Daniels, Chairman of Regent University System, Dr. George deTarnowsky, Miss Marlene Schneider, Journalist, WJXT, Channel 4 and Mayor Hans Tanzler met Mr. Tenko with many interesting facts and near facts which attempted to explain Jacksonville and her progress with "humanizing" the city and her people.

Together the panel and Mr. Tenko provided much for the 'thinking' citizen to muse about. While no great solutions came from the forum, it was interesting to see The Bold City as seen through an historian's eyes.

The Sawmill Slough was dark and forbidding to Mr. Tenko, but he may be surprised to know that many senior citizens are already sharing buildings and other aesthetic involvement out here. UNF may be a nightmare now, but it could be THE NEW AMERICAN DREAM. At least the results of the four programs "Can We Humanize Our Cities?" has proved that humans are trying to escape from the Bonanzaland.

#### TRENDS IN FEDERAL HIRING

Prospects for June graduates interested in government range from generally excellent in engineering and health fields to poor in agricultural and nonspecialty biological sciences. For other disciplines, limited hiring is taking place now and should increase after July 1. Placement chances vary considerably depending on level of competition: opportunities are reasonably good in accounting, especially in some parts of the country where projected vacancies and applicant supply are rather well balanced; but graduates in all disciplines seeking trainee positions nationwide in fields staffed through the Federal Service Entrance Examination (FSEE) face severe competition because of continuing high level of filing by high quality candidates.

#### JOB OUTLOOK INFORMATION DUE AUGUST 1973

The U. S. Office of Education has commissioned the Bureau of Labor Statistics to study job opportunities for the 1970's, which should be completed by August 1973. Assistant commissioner for statistics Dorothy M. Gifford said: "The information gained from the research can help ensure the proper counseling of young people about job opportunities and inform educational planning officials concerned with the expansion of academic training facilities."
