UNF FOUNDATION NOTES SECOND YEAR PROGRESS

Did you know that in 1972 more than 250 individuals and organizations became Volunteer Alumni of UNF, and that their gifts totaling some \$40,000 helped 219 charter class students further their education at UNF? Last year gifts by the UNF Foundation's Volunteer Alumni funded loans, work opportunities, established new scholarships, tuition grants and short term loans.

The Volunteer Alumni program was established by the UNF Foundation as a means of involving area citizens in the University and obtaining needed funds for financial aid. The Foundation is a non-profit corporation established to aid and advise the University. Its Board is comprised of 21 area business, civic and professional leaders.

According to Dr. Thad M. Moseley, local surgeon and UNF Foundations president, "tax dollars provide the basic facilities and operating funds for the University of North Florida, but private gifts are essential to assure adequate funding for educational oppor-

tunity programs such as loans and scholarships. Such gifts are needed to attract federal matching funds and to supplement existing programs".

Trustees of the University of North Florida's Foundation have launched the second year of the volunteer Alumni program. Various student groups and leaders have begun to pool their ideas for a successful means of raising funds to contribute to the program in the fall.

So far \$13,000 has been received from Volunteer Alumni this year. With sustaining support from Volunteer alumni, students will continue, graduate and play a more productive role in the life of this region. And with continuing support, others will take their place and follow their paths as dividends on Volunteer Alumni support.

The bronze plaque outside student affairs lists the names of volunteer alumni whose gifts of \$500 or more qualified them as Honorary Founders.

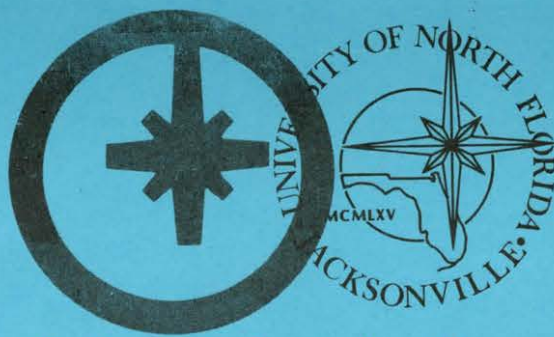

In the past few weeks I have met with the sudden realization that few UNF students are acquainted with the University symbol. All of us have no doubt seen this symbol, but how many people know what it stands for?

Two ancient devices - the circle and the compass rose - have been adopted and modified in creating a graphic symbol for the new University of North Florida. The compass rose, long a direction finding device for mariners, here symbolizes the University's role in providing direction for lives. The placement of the compass rose in the upper northeast quadrant of the circle describes the new institution's upper division character and its location in the northeast of Florida. The circle itself signifies the community which the University is dedicated to serving.

The symbol was inspired by the University of North Florida seal designed under the direction of President Thomas G. Carpenter. The seal will continue to be used on formal documents. The symbol, as a simpler representation of the seal, will be used in the University's publications and other communicative devices.

Films at UNF

UNF's third movie of the summer season, "Beneath the Planet of the Apes", will be shown in the Library Lounge at 8:00 pm on Friday, July 6. The movie starring Charlton Heston, James Franciscus, Kim Hunter and Maurice Evans concerns the capture and escape of the principal characters from the fascistic ape rulers of the earth. Heston is located in the subterranean ruins of New York, inhabited by skinless human mutants who worship the Holy Bomb. The apes attack and Heston blows up the world, but there is a lot of excitement before this spectacular climax.

HEALTH HINTS

Too much sun can produce painful and disfiguring sunburn, dry skin, disfiguring pigment spots, warty overgrowths, and even skin cancer. Physicians report that many twenty year olds have already developed sun damaged skin. The incidence of skin cancer is higher in the south. Use a sun screen because the burning rays of the sun are from 10:00 am until 3:00 pm. Remember that SUNBURN does occur on an overcast day! Beach umbrellas will not offer protection because of the reflection from the water and the sand.

Note that when you are reporting an accident or call for help, that you state your location and that you are using the HOTLINE phone.

Enrollment Increasing

According to Dr. Roy Lassiter, UNF Vice President, 1,635 students are registered for the summer term classes. Of these 1,635 students, 1,257 are fulltime students, which is about 200 more than the projected number for the summer quarter.

Between 80 and 90 per cent of the students taking classes in the fall enrolled for summer courses. Compared to the normal university retention rate of 55 to 60 per cent UNF is considerably ahead of other university averages.

Dr. Lassiter also noted that approximately 100 students will graduate from UNF at the end of the summer term. Compared to the 34 June graduates UNF's second graduating class will be almost three times as large as its first.

No BS at UNF

It has been brought to my attention that many UNF students are unfamiliar with the degree they will receive from this University. Several students feel that they will attain a BS Bachelor of Science degree, when in fact this university does not offer a BS degree.

The degrees from this University are as follows: BBS - Bachelor Business Administration, BA - Bachelor Arts, MBA - Masters of Education, and BAF - Bachelor of Arts in Education.

When the ring representative was on the UNF campus June 27, students insisted when ordering a ring that they would receive a BS degree from this institution. Furthermore, they ordered rings and requested the BS insignia be placed on the ring as the representation of the degree they would receive.

In conclusion, the degree you receive from this university should correspond with the degree insignia on your class ring. Therefore it wouldn't hurt us to check into exactly what degree we will be receiving from UNF.

Library Goes FASTCAT

FASTCAT is not a feline -- it stands for fast cataloging. The UNF Library has implemented a procedure to speed newly-acquired materials through processing and to the shelves. FASTCAT, in conjunction with the Library's approval book program, will allow public access to the most current information with the least possible delay.

As soon as a book has been accepted and the invoice paid, it is assigned a temporary number based on Library of Congress subject classification and is shelved in the special FASTCAT collection. The collection is accessible through the Title Card Catalog or by browsing the shelves. For routine items, the material will be on the FASTCAT shelves within days after acceptance. As cataloging becomes available, FASTCAT books will be pulled, fully cataloged, and shelved in the general collection. At that time, complete author, title, and subject cards will be filed in the public catalogs.

A small percentage of items received by the library will not be eligible for the FASTCAT processing but may be made available by inquiring at the Reference Desk.
