UNF JUDO CHAMP BUSY

The University of North Florida's only claim to collegiate athletic fame has kept himself busy during the summer months. Ronny Allen, a UNF senior physical education major and judo champion, has participated this summer in two AAU tournaments, winning top honors in both.

Since taking up the sport about three years ago, Ronny has quickly proven himself to be a contender for national honors, according to Richard H. Reisinger, UNF assistant professor of physical education and Allen's mentor. Reisinger pointed out that Allen has regularly played in tournaments against older, more experienced judo experts, winning most of his matches.

Currently, Ronny is the 1972 YMCA national judo champion and holds the Florida AAU championship, in addition to his recent victories. He took third place in the March Eastern Collegiate Championships in Hayward California, also held in March.

Besides training for competition, Ronny maintains a B average in his academic work at UNF. He pays most of his expenses to participate in the var-

ious tournaments and meets in which he competes.

Allen quickly credits two factors in his meteoric rise to judo prominence. "If it hadn't been for Coach Reisinger, I wouldn't have been able to get to the tournaments on the West Coast, especially the National Collegiate Championships. He's not only my instructor, he's behind me 100 per cent, and that's a definite psychological boost for anyone in an individual contact sport. His belief in my ability has helped me to gain confidence for competition," Allen added.

"Another big help I've had has been from the guys I train with at the judo club," Allen continued. "It's sort of like in football; the second team rarely gets mentioned. But without that second team to practice with, the first team couldn't produce. Without the guys I practice with or work out with, I probably could never have begun to reach my potential. It's real important to have guys like that in the judo club, because they give me support, encouragement, and help," Allen said.

"But I really have to thank Coach Reisinger most of all," Ronny concluded. "He's the kind of consistent coach an athlete needs. He never puts me under pressure, and he'll do anything to help me or anyone else he's working with to maximize their potential."

Ronny Allen is looking ahead to bigger game in his judo career. He hopes to participate in the "Triple Crown" of judo. First, he'll have to survive the Eastern Collegiate meet in Newark, N.J., next March, followed by the National Collegiate meet, to be held at Michigan State University, two weeks later. The ultimate for Allen will be participating in the National AAU Tournament at San Jose State University of California during April, 1974. "That's the tournament from which the AAU selects its Olympians," said Allen, with a touch of awe in his voice.

Jacksonville's Ronny Allen as a member of the Olympic judo team would be quite a feather in the cap of UNF, a university which has no organized intercollegiate sports program.

College of Business Gets New Faculty

Five new faculty members have been appointed to the teaching staff of the University of North Florida's College of Business Administration for the coming academic year. The appointments were announced by Dr. James M. Parrish, Dean of the UNF Business College.

The college's department of economics greets two assistant professors, Dr. Joseph E. Pluta and Dr. Earle C Traynham, Jr. Dr. Traynham also will serve as an academic and career advisor at the University.

The department of management, marketing, and business law will have a new faculty member in each of its divisions. Dr. Robert C. Pickhardt will serve as associate professor of management; Dr. Noel B. Zabriskie, associate professor of marketing; and Robert W. Schupp, assistant professor of business law.

Announcing the appointments, Dean Parrish said, "We are quite pleased with the overall quality of this group of faculty additions. Our graduate teaching staff will be materially strengthened by Dr. Pickhardt and Dr. Zabriskie, not only because of their strong educational backgrounds, but especially from their extensive experience in working with graduate students."

"Dr. Traynham and Prof. Schupp will bring new depth to one of UNF's most successful innovations -- our academic and career advising system. Mr. Schupp also becomes our first business law teacher with his legal training and experience in Florida", according to Dean Parrish.

Attention: Students, faculty, and Staff of UNF, ALL PARKING DECALS WILL EXPIRE AUGUST 31, 1973. RENEWAL FOR FACULTY AND STAFF WILL BE AUGUST 15, 1973, STUDENTS, UPON REGISTRATION FOR FALL SEMESTER. Fee will be \$5.00 for one car and \$.35 for each additional car. Decals for new car after first decal issued fee is also \$.35. Lost or defaced decals will cost original fee of \$1.00. NEW CO-OP FOR PSYCHOLOGY AND SOCIOLOGY SENIORS interested in a career in Human Services.

Beginning September 24, 1973, the Big Brothers of Greater Jacksonville, Inc. is participating as a cooperative education employer in the Employment Experience Program offered at the University of North Florida. The Big Brothers organization provides professional counseling services to fatherless boys between the ages of 8 and 17. Mr. Jack Williams, a caseworker with the agency, will be the work counselor-supervisor. The starting salary is \$80.00 per week plus car allowance of 10¢ per mile. The benefits include potential full-time employment following graduation from the University of North Florida. Interested seniors must be at least 21 years of age and they must be able to take direction and carry through responsibilities. Transportation is required. Students may earn 5 hours of academic credit upon completion of two work periods. An orientation session will be held during the week of August 6, 1973.
