CHANCELLOR Florida Board of Regents Chancellor Robert B. Mautz
MAUTZ VISITS flew in from Tallahassee this morning to tour the
SITE campus site with President Carpenter and a small
UNF delegation. Accompanying the Chancellor was
Forrest M. Kelly, Jr., chief physical planning consultant.

It was the first visit to the site for the
Chancellor since the groundbreaking ceremony so it must have
been quite a surprise for him! He will stay for lunch and fly
back to Tallahassee this afternoon.

CONSTRUCTION The rate in which the buildings are going up is
PROGRESS nothing short of amazing. Hilton Meadows, director
REPORT of physical facilities, and Tom Bostwick, engineer,
report that progress is being made on the exterior,
which is being bricked, and the interior, where room partitions are
being placed.

The main entrance road is being laid with lime rock
as the primary base. That road will take you past the 15-18 acre
lake, which is filling rapidly with water. The island in the
center of the lake will be accessible by a foot bridge. The pilings
for the bridge have already been set.

The chilling equipment for the buildings is being
installed in the central utilities building, and the sewer tank has
been buried.

Bids on the parking lots and road extensions will be
opened March 29 by the Transportation Department. Meanwhile, work
is being done on the specifications for temporary parking space.

The March 31 bus trip to the site will be an exciting
one, so plan to go with the tour.

on vocational-technical education under the Federation
