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

TRL 454, "Urban Transportation" is being offered this winter quarter and is open to all students, Arts and Sciences, Business, and Education. It is your chance to find out the hows, whats, whys, and wherefore urban transportation Jacksonville, in Florida, and America; now and in the future! did those bridge tolls go up? there a monorail in Jacksonville's future? Can positive action in the fuel crunch be taken by the UNF community? What are transportation planners doing to reverse urban blight, and suburban sprawl? What will our politicians let them do?

"Urban Transportation" will look at these and many other questions which should be of interest to any UNF student. Because of this, and because of the limitless implications of urban transportation, TRL 454 has been designed for all UNF students; there are no business prerequisites! Ingram, one of the instructors for TRL 454, is the Executive Director of the Jacksonville Downtown Development Authority. The other instructor is Ed Mueller, Executive Director of the Jacksonville Transporation Authority. "Urban Transportation" will be a real life, not just a textbook study.

Students who are covered by the group insurance policy that the University holds with Continental Insurance Company, may pick up an identification card in the Office of Student Activities. A cancelled check or cashier's receipt should be presented as proof of payment.

Reminder to Financial Aid Students Failure to have your registration fee card validated at the cashier's window prior to Thursday, January 10, 1974, will result in your being assessed the \$25.00 late fee.

Fatigued? Headache? Sore throat swollen glands and fever? Could be "just what's going aroung" or it might be infectious mononucleosis. There is little known about "mono". It is believed the Epstein-Barr Virus is responsible.

Lymphocytes are white blood cells responsible for a portion of the body's natural immunity system. In mono, the white blood cell count increases sharply with atypical lymphocytes. Diagnosis is confirmed by a "mono" test or heterophile agglutination.

Symptoms vary with individuals. In addition to sore throat, swollen glands, and fatigue; there may be a rash, enlarged spleen, and even jaundice. Treatment is dependent upon severity of the disease and its associated complications. Mono usually affects the individual for a day to two weeks, for some longer.

If you suspect you have mono let a physician make the diagnosis. For more information consult the Student Health Office.
