FOUNDATION WORK TO BEGIN

Bids on the foundation work were opened Wednesday, with Wesley of Florida being low bidder at \$49,887. The contract includes construction of hydraulic elevator pits in addition to foundation work for the four academic buildings. Work is scheduled for completion in mid-October.

Bids for actual construction of the buildings will be sought next month, with the bid opening scheduled for early October.

PROGRESS REPORT FROM THE SITE

Hilton Meadows, director of physical facilities reports excellent progress on the main entrance road construction and toward the development of two of a series of lake sites on the campus.

He also announced the appropriation of sufficient additional funding for the development of approximately 1,200 permanent-type parking spaces to be ready by opening in the Fall of 1972. This is twice the paved space the University of West Florida had at opening date. Needing 1,000, the UWF only received funding for 600.

TREND COVERS THE UNF

The Aug. 26 issue of the Jacksonville Trend weekly newspaper gave front page coverage to the growth in educational facilities in the Arlington-Southside area with pictures of the University of North Florida building model and the new Florida Junior College south campus.

The inside story of the progress and plans of the UNF, by-lined by Skip Livingston, director of public relations, was accompanied by three environmental sketches of the UNF building. A clip-out and mail-in coupon was also included for interested students who want more information about the UNF.

This special Third Anniversary Progress edition of the Trend will be mailed directly to 25,000 Arlington and Southside residents.

Students from Florida Junior College will be ushering in the many guests at the University of North Florida groundbreaking, September 18, acting as ambassadors from the UNF sister school.

Judy Ivey and Larry Nelson, two of the student models pictured in the new recruitment brochures, are helping the UNF again, by rounding up FJC students to greet and usher the ceremony's guests.

Judy and Larry will brief the students on the program and their duties before guests arrive, and organize the volunteer ushers.

Dr. Laurence B. Green, chairman of the department of psychology has been appointed to the Channel 7 Advisory Committee of Emergency School Assistance Television Programming, which, translated, means school desegregation.

BOR OKAYS MONEY TRANSFER

Recent action by the Board of Regents facilities committee may make it possible for the University to save thousands of taxpayer dollars and plan ahead for future expansion of student body and physical facilities.

The committee has authorized a transfer of nearly \$800,000 into the Phase IB budget to permit construction of a central utility facility and systems that will accommodate projected growth to 1976.

Hilton Meadows said the transfer, if approved by the State Cabinet, will mean the UNF won't have to suffer the frequent discomforts and dislocations involved in constantly expanding the utilities systems at their points of origin as the campus grows. Moreover it means taxpayers dollars will be saved by designing and constructing the system now when costs are lower.

PRESIDENT'S TEDIOUS TASK

President Thomas G. Carpenter is involved in some public girl-watching this week but it's all on the up and up. Dr. Carpenter is one of five preliminary judges for the Miss Jacksonville contest sponsored by the Jacksonville Jaycees.

Wednesday he and fellow judges rated the 38 contestants in swim suit, evening wear and talent competition. Thursday the judges conducted personal interviews with each of the girls.

Official judges will make the final decision from the 10 finalists Saturday night in the Prudential auditorium. The winner will go on to the Miss Florida contest, a preliminary to the Miss America contest.
