### DRUG TRAINING CENTER ESTABLISHED

In cooperation with the U.S. Navy Drug Rehabilitation Center, Jacksonville, the University of North Florida has established an Institute for Drug Rehabilitation. The first task of the institute will be the training of para-professional rehabilitation counselors for the Navy.

Dr. Robert Mitchell, assistant dean for continuing education, has been working for months with Captain William F. Moore of the Naval drug center in planning the cosponsored institute.

The counselor training program will begin Monday (Aug. 14) and continue for six weeks. Enrollment is limited to 35 participants. UNF will provide faculty to train Naval personnel in counseling theory, interviewing skills and techniques and rationale of both individual and group counseling.

Dr. Johnny Arnette, associate of students at UNF and a specialist in counseling and guidance, will serve as director of the 120 hour program.

Faculty for the program will be drawn from the UNF's Office of Student Affairs and the department of psychology.

In the joint announcement, Capt. Moore and Dr. Carpenter said the Institute's long range objectives would be to provide a variety of continuing education service to persons involved in the alleviation of the drug abuse problem.
