1981 Distinguished Faculty Award

Drs. Linda A. Foley and Jay A. Smith, Jr., share the University of North Florida Distinguished Faculty Award for 1982, selected by a vote of their faculty peers.

Their selection for this honor proves their ability to withstand the most rigorous test of all: approval by their faculty colleagues. Their academic records are distinguished in all of the areas by which faculty are evaluated: teaching, research, and service.

DR. FOLEY

Dr. Linda A. Foley, chairperson of the Department of Psychology and associate professor of psychology, received her B.A. from Western Connecticut State College and her M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Florida.

A member of the UNF psychology faculty since 1974, she initially was appointed as an assistant professor and was promoted to associate professor before being selected as interim department chairperson last August. This past week she was named to head the department on a permanent basis.

Dr. Foley has served as president of the UNF Faculty Association, a member of the Presidential Search Committee, the State Faculty Forum, the Publications Board, Sex Equity Committee, and Tenure and Promotion Committee, among others.

In her community, Dr. Foley has been active in establishing a youth mediation program for the State Attorney's office and also helping to establish the Citizen's Dispute Settlement Program. She serves on the boards of directors for numerous local educational and social welfare organizations.

A consultant to the U.S. Navy in Jacksonville on drug and alcohol abuse, she also is principal investigator for a \$45,000 grant awarded by the Mott Foundation for the evaluation of a program for delinquents. Dr. Foley's research and service to the community often lead her out of the classroom and into prisons and courtrooms.

With more than 32 journal articles and book chapters to her name, she presently has seven potential publications under editorial consideration.

Other credits include her selection to Psi Chi and Phi Kappa Phi national honor societies, American Men and Women in Science, Who's Who of American Women, and Outstanding Young Women in America.

DR. SMITH

Dr. Jay A. Smith, Jr., chairman of the Department of Transportation and Logistics and professor of transportation and logistics, earned his B.S. at Louisiana State University, his M.S. at the University of Tennessee and both the M.B.A. and D.B.A. from the University of Maryland.

He joined the UNF faculty in 1972, previously serving as assistant director of the Transportation Institute at Southern Illinois University and on the faculty at the University of Maryland.

Dr. Smith began his service to UNF as an associate professor of transportation and logistics. He was named acting department head in 1974 and chairperson in 1976. Under his direction, the department gained recognition as the State University System's Center of Excellence in Transportation and Logistics.

In addition to extensive consulting experience with both government and private industry, Smith has been named principal or co-principal investigator for funded research projects totalling more than \$670,000 in the fields of transportation, economic development, transit unions and management, and transportation education.

He has served on the Board of Regent's Committee on Enrollment Policy and the Task Force on Energy Research, as well as several key university committees.

Smith has served professionally as International President of the Transportation Research Forum, on the Transportation Research Board of the National Academy of Sciences, and editorial board of the *International Journal of Civil Engineering*, and as a gubernatorial appointment as one of Florida's seven members to the Multi-State Transportation Board.

During the past five years he has authored or co-authored three books or related chapters and has contributed numerous journal articles and monographs to his field.

He also completed two tours of duty with the U.S. Army during the early 1960's

The Honorable Bob Graham
Governor of the State of Florida
Commencement Speaker

Bob Graham, the 38th Governor of the State of Florida, is a life-long resident of Florida, born in Coral Gables. His first recognition as an outstanding citizen came when at age 16 he was named Dade County's "best all 'round teenage boy" by *The Miami Herald*. The following year, he was elected president of Miami Senior High's student body.

A leading student on the collegiate level, Graham — during his studies for a bachelor of arts degree at the University of Florida — was chancellor of the Honor Court, president of Sigma Nu, president of Phi Eta Sigma, and a member of Florida Blue Key. He continued his education and was awarded his law degree in 1962 by Harvard Law School.

Public leadership — as well as respect for the value of physical labor — were inherited from Graham's father, known as "Cap" for his World War I service. "Cap" had been a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Governor in 1944 and was a state senator during the 1937-1943 sessions.

Bob Graham was elected to the Florida House of representatives in 1966. Four years later, he was elected to the Florida Senate, where, for eight years, he served the citizens of Florida, paying particular attention to legislation dealing with education and health services.

Appropriately, work was the theme of the first successful campaign for the Governorship ever run by a Dade Countian. Graham told of his campaign experiences in his *Workdays: Finding Florida on the Job*, a sampling of his 100 jobs from the oil fields of Jay to the tomato fields of Collier county.

During his first legislative session in 1979, the new Governor's energies were focused on the preparation and passage of the state's first biennial budget as well as with the passage of law enforcement measures aimed at the illegal drug trade in South Florida.

His service to education has been commendable, through both his efforts to encourage legislation benefitting education and his service as chairman of three prestigious national educational organizations for 1980-81: the Education Commission of the States, the Southern Regional Education Board, and the Intergovernmental Advisory Council to the Department of Education.

The Commencement Ceremony

The commencement ceremony as we know it today has its roots in the academic traditions and heritage passed on by European universities of the 14th century.

While the ceremony itself has been modified to conform with more modern times, the academic dress of faculty and graduates still carries the vestiges of medieval times.

The cut of the academic gown has an ancient significance. Once the symbol of rank or class, it today represents tradition and achievement. The cap, now a flat "mortar board," once was soft, full and draped. The robes reflect the everyday dress of the Middle Ages.

Today's graduates and faculty fall into three categories as far as gowns are concerned. The bachelor's degree candidate or graduate wears a robe with long, open sleeves, but without a distinctive hood. The master's degree candidate or graduate wears a robe with long, closed sleeves, the sleeves being slit near the upper part of the arm to accommodate hand movement. This candidate wears an abbreviated hood lined in satin with the colors of the degree granting institution and edged in velvet with a color which signifies the discipline in which the degree was earned.

Faculty members holding doctoral degrees wear robes with round, open sleeves, ornamented with black velvet. While doctoral robes normally are black, many have been specifically designed in various color schemes by the granting institution or by the degree recipient. The doctoral hood

is larger than the master's, but the color scheme is identical to that worn by the master's candidate.

At the University of North Florida, baccalaureate degree candidates wear a modified gown, reflecting the University's colors, light blue and white. These colors also are carried on the master's hoods and are represented in the gowns worn by commencement marshalls.

A 14th century writer observed that the University of Paris was the first institution to assign distinctive costumes and colors to its four faculties. The University of North Florida's three colleges now employ colors that were prescribed by the 1895 Intercollegiate Commission as representing those disciplines and carried over to our modern day. The College of Arts and Sciences, offering the Bachelor of Arts degree, is signified by a white cap tassel. The College of Business Administration, offering the Bachelor of Business Administration degree, uses a drab, or light olive brown, tassel. The College of Education, offering the Bachelor of Arts in Education degree, uses the traditional light blue tassel. Two other UNF degree programs, Technology, offering the Bachelor of Technology, and Nursing, offering the Bachelor of Science in Nursing, have orange and apricot cap tassels, respectively. Master's degree candidates wear black tassels, with the discipline color reflected on the candidates' hoods in velvet. Most doctoral holders wear gold tassels.

The University of North Florida

The University of North Florida officially came into existence with legislation passed by the 1965 Florida Legislature and opened in October 1972, offering programs at the junior, senior, and beginning graduate levels.

One of the nine institutions of the State University System of Florida, UNF received its accreditation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in December 1974 at both the undergraduate and graduate levels simultaneously. That accreditation action by the SACS was re-evaluated in 1979, resulting in reaccreditation for a ten year period.

The College of Business Administration has been accorded accreditation by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business at the undergraduate level, the first upper-level program to be so honored. The College recently was reaccredited at the undergraduate level and granted approval also at the Master's level by AACSB.

Within the College of Business Administration, the Department of Transportation and Logistics was designated as one of the first five State University System "Programs of Distinction," and later, as a "Center of Excellence," a direct result of the Florida Legislature's emphasis on programs to serve the needs of the state.

Totally resolved to the ideal of equal opportunity, the University enrolls and employs qualified persons regardless of race, creed, sex, age, physical limitation, or natural origin.

The Symbol and Seal

Two ancient devices--the circle and the compass rose--have been adopted and modified to create a graphic symbol for the University of North Florida. The compass rose, long a direction-finding device for mariners, here symbolizes the University's role in providing direction for our lives. The placement of the compass rose in the upper northeast quadrant of the circle describes the institution's upper division character and its location in northeast Florida. The circle itself signifies the community which the University is dedicated to serve.

The University symbol was inspired by the University of North Florida seal. The seal is used on formal documents, such as each graduate's diploma. The symbol, as a simpler representation of the seal, is used on University publications and other communicative devices.

The Jacksonville Light Infantry Guard

The Jacksonville Light Infantry Color Guard was established by the University's Army ROTC detachment and is composed of ROTC cadets enrolled in that program. Formation of the color guard became a reality, after several years of planning and discussion, with the appropriation of funds for authentic uniforms and weapons by the UNF Student Government Association.

The color guard commemorates the Jacksonville Light Infantry Company, formed in April 1857. During the Civil War, this company saw action as part of Confederate forces' Company "A", 3rd Florida Infantry. It fought in the battles of Chattanooga, Perryville during the Kentucky campaign, and, under the command of General Braxton Bragg, CSA, the battles of Murfreesborough, Chickamauga, Missionary Ridge, the Mississippi campaign, and the battle of Atlanta against General Sherman. The JLI was disestablished in April 1865.

The company was reactivated in 1880 to assist with the Mill Riot and, at that time, established its distinctive uniforms.

In 1898, the JLI volunteered for service during the Spanish-American War, but saw no action.

During World War I, the JLI saw overseas action as a company of the 1st Separate Battalion against Imperial German forces. Mustered out in 1918, it was never reformed.

The JLI color guard will represent UNF in a variety of community events and ceremonies.
