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ELECTION RESULTS IN The University took the first step toward implementing a new democratic form of governance Thursday with the election of ten staff members to Career Service seats in the general assembly. Dr. Thomas Mongar, chairman of the elections committee, reported 127 employees cast ballots for a 70 percent turnout.

Connie Savage of Personnel led vote-getters with 55 and earned one of the three two-year terms in District B. Following Mrs. Savage and also winning two-year terms were Janice Sconyers, student affairs, 46 votes, and Kay Noell, department of fine arts, 43. Marty Weitsen, bookstore, 42 votes, and Joyce Reynolds, department of health and physical education, 39, took one-year terms.

In District A, two-year terms were won by Helen Evans, administrative services, 43 votes, and Nancy Howell, physical facilities, 42. Earning one-year seats were Ginny Graves, department of psychology, and B. J. Brown, president's office, tied at 39; and Jackie Briggs, public relations, 36.

Complete election results are posted at various points in the building. Others in District B: Shirley McFadden, library, 27; Shirley Vaughan, registrar, Jim Weese, registrar, 25 each; Cynthia Markwell, library, 17; Wynona Sadler, library, 16. Others in District A: Ambuj Jain, finance and accounting, 33; Cathy Church, physical facilities, 30; Marilyn Hamrick, administrative affairs, 10. Student elections, scheduled for Oct. 17 and Oct. 18, will be the next phase in establishing the general assembly. The assembly will convene Oct. 20.

FOUNDATION MOVES ON UP The UNF staff came in for high praise last week from Dr. Thad Moseley, president of the UNF Foundation Board. Dr. Moseley told a meeting of the Board that the UNF staff was among the major donors to Volunteer Alumni and demonstrated a level of commitment which had served as an example to the Board and the community. Staff donations and pledges amounted to \$3,500. Proceeds of the program go to student financial aid as matching monies for federal funds and to support UNF sponsored scholarships.

In other business, the Board toured the campus, learned of long range campus development plans from President Carpenter, heard a treasurer's report from Dean Jim C. Haywood, and a fund drive report from Dean George W. Corrick. During the

week following the meeting Foundation Trustees secured an additional \$6,000 in gifts and pledges to bring the current fund total to \$35,000.
