FIRST AID  
PROCEDURES

The following steps should be followed in case of emergencies on campus: 1. A minor injury, requiring a band-aid or merthiolate swab, should be reported to your supervisor and the personnel department. The injured person should report to the Student Health Center or after hours, to the public safety office for treatment. 2. A serious injury, i.e., broken bones, excessive bleeding, etc., should be reported to the public safety office immediately. Its men have the training and apparatus to handle emergency cases. The accidents or injury should also be reported to the personnel department. 3. If there is any doubt about the seriousness of an injury, treat it as serious and let the public safety office decide.

The State Division of Personnel in Tallahassee has approved special appointment rates for clerical, secretarial and computer classes retroactive to July 1, 1972. Career Service employees in the classes which were designated for special appointment rates will receive bi-weekly pay adjustments retroactive to July 1 if they were employed prior to that date or for the number of days they have been employed after July 1.

The special appointment rates were determined by the State Division of Personnel after studying salaries paid for comparable jobs by public and private employers in Duval County.

The department of personnel staff is now in the process of reviewing employment data in order to determine if other classes should have been included in this adjustment.
