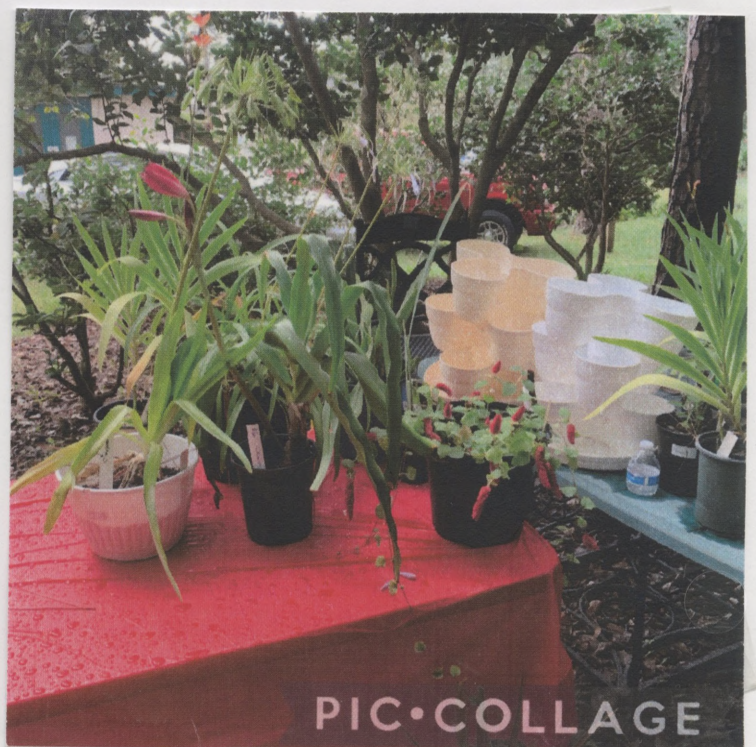

The 12th annual Mandarin Garden Club Craft Fair will be held on Nov. 6 from 9 a.m. — 4 p.m. The Garden Club will have a café with all kinds of goodies and plants will also be for sale. Since 2010, the Craft Fair has offered a variety of great crafts, home baked goods and garden items. The club's neighbors, the Masons, will offer a BBQ lunch for sale. If you are interested in participating as a crafter or artist, there are outdoor 12' x 12' spaces available for \$30. Since 1988, the Master Gardeners have worked with the Duval County Extension Office and used the Mandarin Garden Club's grounds as demonstration gardens. The Master Gardeners work in the demonstration gardens twice a month, but as of January 2021 they have been working every Wednesday in the morning. This change allowed the garden team to keep up with the needs of the gardens and shortened the time needed to spend in the heat of the day.

By working in the gardens, the Master Gardeners are demonstrating which plants grow well here in Zone 9 and how best to grow them. They also learn how to combat harmful insects and how much irrigation is required. By having the demonstration gardens onsite at the Mandarin Garden Club,

the community can see the knowledge and expertise the team provides. Some Mandarin Garden Club members join the Master Gardeners each week to work in the gardens and provide much needed assistance. Also, Garden Club members take care of the gardens immediately adjacent to the clubhouse.

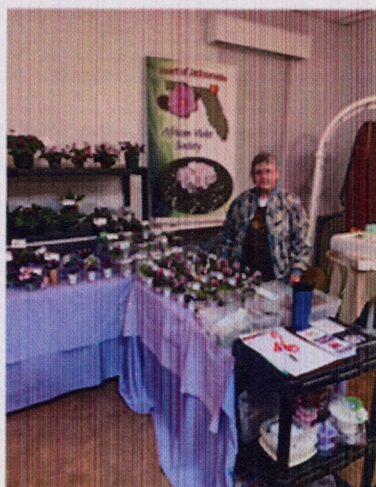

Mandarin Garden Club update

Members of the Mandarin Garden Club celebrated Christmas at their clubhouse with a festive program that included several Christmas poems being read by various members of the club. Tables were decorated with seasonal settings including snowmen, reindeer, Santas, small Christmas trees, nutcrackers and toy trains. At the annual party, funds were collected and a van-load of non-perishables was donated to the food bank, in addition to 175 hats knitted by the Crafty Ladies group.

At least three of the four circles collected "Shoeboxes of Love" for the homeless in the area. The shoebox was filled with items such as soap/washcloth, shampoo, toothpaste, toothbrush, dental floss, socks, comb/brush, nail clipper, deodorant, wet wipes, lotion and other personal hygiene items. A warm blanket was wrapped around the box. The boxes were delivered to the City Rescue Mission and given to recipients at the Missions' annual Christmas meal.

The Mandarin Garden Club gives back to the community all year long. Any time members gather at the clubhouse for a meeting or to work on crafts, they bring items that can benefit others. Since 2008, the Mandarin Garden Club has gathered and donated items to the local food bank.

Old cell phones have been collected since 2009 and are donated to the Duval County 4-H program. Donations of old eyeglasses and cases are given to the Lions Club. In 2011, the garden club started collecting the pop tops from canned items, which are donated to the Ronald McDonald House. Retired flags that are brought into the clubhouse are presented to the Mandarin Community Club and are given a proper disposal at their flag ceremony.

Gardening

As the first Mandarin NewsLine edition of 2022 rolls off the presses, I'm looking at the gardening year beginning again, but perhaps it's not the only way to observe the natural world. There are broad natural cycles to follow if we are to be successful gardeners, but looking at the big picture sometimes leaves us missing the details.

Two insect discoveries in the first week of December intrigued me. My pink gaura plants had attracted some aphids, which were hard to spot, being almost the same deep pink color as the foliage where they were feeding. Aphids have an interesting life cycle. As insects, one might assume they mate and lay eggs; the young hatch, eat, mature, etc. But for most of the year aphids birth live young female clones, and later in the year they produce eggs which overwinter. These two articles shed some light on aphids' lives: <https://tinyurl.com/yc498y8k> and <https://tinyurl.com/4t6jewc4>. I've also discovered that there's a wooly hackberry aphid — which explains the sooty mold that was an unsightly problem for plants growing beneath my tree.

The second was an encounter with a bee, possibly a leafcutter type. It had become trapped in an empty yellow watering can and when I tipped it out, it seemed disoriented and didn't fly away. To my surprise, it didn't hesitate to walk onto my hand and very tickly it was! Although I found some flowers for it to crawl onto, it stayed put. It took flight briefly, but landed very clumsily, too close to a lawn that gets sprayed regularly with chemicals, so I picked it up again. Finally it crawled onto a beggar's tick flower (<https://tinyurl.com/47yku342>). It certainly hadn't been behaving like a healthy bee, but the following morning when I went to check it had gone.

Last year, one of my large coonies had

The facility was built in 1979 and care was taken to preserve many of the large oak trees on the property to create a beautiful and serene area to be used by everyone. The Charles Neviaser Educational Institute was built two years ago and is an extension of the main building. The Hospice Center has included a serene memorial garden, various benches and statues, a gazebo, fountain and pond. Many beautiful annuals and perennials have been planted on the property and they enhanced the serene atmosphere.

Additionally, special awards were recently presented to three people with ties to the Mandarin Garden Club. Lifetime awards were given to Linda Carvalho, (Dogwood Circle) and Regina Allen (Cherokee Rose Circle) for their outstanding contributions to the Garden Club. Dom Colanero was a member of the Master Gardener program even though he is not an official Garden Club member. Every year since 2003, Mandarin Museum & Historical Society has honored a person who has made significant contributions to the community — like Miss Agnes Jones did — by presenting the annual Miss Aggie Award.

The 2020 Miss Aggie Award was unique because it was the first time two people were selected. It was also unique because a COVID-19 pandemic was taking place and Miss Aggie Day 2020 had to be cancelled since we could not bring a crowd of people together. Finally, on May 22, 2021, Miss Aggie Day 2020 was celebrated at the historic Mandarin Store and Post Office.

The recipients of the 2020 Miss Aggie Award were long-time residents Sam Folds and Wanda

Bosworth. The awards were presented by Mandarin Museum & Historical Society vice-president and great niece of Agnes Jones, Karen Roumillat.

Folds was born and raised in Mandarin and has served clients in Mandarin through his real estate business for more than 40 years. He has been a lifelong member of the Episcopal Church of Our Saviour and a Charter Member of the Rotary Club of Mandarin, where he has served in many roles. He has always been an active advocate for the community by speaking out about and supporting all efforts to preserve the integrity of Mandarin's landscape and history.

Bosworth has made volunteering in the community her profession. Since 1986 she has served

through her involvement, support, and leadership in the Mandarin Community Club, Mandarin Garden Club, PTAs and activities of Mandarin Middle School and Mandarin High School, Mandarin Women's Club and many other organizations in Jacksonville as well.

Sawmill, erecting a sugar cane grinder, and many other projects than can even be named.
