ESSENTIAL SKILLS FOR THE T&L PROFESSIONAL. ARE YOU READY TO EXCEL?

In the summer of 2010 I graduated from UNF with my Bachelor in Business Administration in Transportation and Logistics. I added CTL to end of my name, and was pretty sure I could take on the world. Imagine my surprise and dismay when I started my first position working with a Transportation Management System (TMS) and discovered that the world of logistics actually included a lot of Microsoft Excel too! Knowing little about Excel, my manager spent the first few weeks teaching me about my role in the company and how to do essential functions in Excel such as pivot tables, Vlookups, and conditional formatting. Once I mastered the key functions, I was hooked on learning all I could to be more effective and efficient at my job.

Over the past five years I have seen numerous students graduate and enter the workforce just like me, wellprepared and full of book knowledge, but lacking proficiency in the technical tools needed to complete day to day tasks. A 2012 WorldatWork/Deloitte Consulting study reveals that 89 percent of professionals use spreadsheet applications such as Microsoft. If there is one message I could share with students and recent grads, it is to learn more about the basic computer programs that are such an important aspect of our daily jobs. Logisticians may use their knowledge and advanced computer programs to move the world, but business decisions are made based on the ability to manipulate and analyze data using a tool like Excel.

Recognizing the need for Excel skills in the workplace, a group of T&L alumni got together to help students gear up for the job market. They created Excel workshops to teach functions that are important to master for the T&L profession. All UNF students are welcome and the event is free of charge thanks to a sponsorship from the CSCMP Jacksonville Roundtable. On Sat. Oct.10, I will be the person behind the podium who just five years ago had never even heard of a pivot table. So don't be like me. Invest in your future and take time to become proficient in the most widely used spreadsheet tool in the world. You and your boss will be glad you did!

LIFE AFTER GRADUATION: OLIVIA MUSSELWHITE

Olivia Musselwhite graduated from UNF with a Bachelor's degree in Transportation and Logistics in December 2014. She joined the Transportation and Logistics Society as soon as she declared her major and served on the board as Assistant Newsletter Editor.

Olivia joined Crowley Maritime Corporation's third party logistics group as a part-time student in August 2013. TLS helped Olivia prepare for her job because she learned how to work in teams, meet deadlines, network, and stay up to date on current events in the industry. At Crowley she was part of the Project, Government, and Emergency Response team that consisted of six people. She was able to jump right in and make a positive impact on day-to-day operations.

Olivia participated in Career Day twice, as a committee volunteer and an interviewee. She toured JAXPORT during Big Sea Day as a Propeller Club Student Port/TLS member and says it was one of her most memorable experiences as a T&L student.

In August Olivia celebrated her 2 year anniversary as an employee with Crowley Maritime Corporation. Now a Crowley Freight Broker, her typical day consists of tracking and tracing rail and over the road (OTR) shipments, communicating with customers, negotiating rates with drivers to cover loads, and coordinating both rail and OTR crossdock shipments. On average, she works 45-55 hours per week.

Upon graduation, Olivia applied for and received CTL certification from AST&L through the blanket waiver program. Olivia's advice to current students in the T&L program is to get involved ASAP and take full advantage of what TLS and the T&L Flagship has to offer, especially T&L Career Day. She says every T&L student needs to participate because there won't be another opportunity to interview with and/or speak to so many great companies all in one day anywhere else.
