A somewhat unexpected--but sorely needed--allocation of \$1.5 million for third phase construction at UNF was scheduled for approval by the Board of Regents meeting Friday in Gainesville. If approved by the Board and then by the State Cabinet the funds will mean more classroom and office space and an assembly hall earlier than expected. President Thomas G. Carpenter said the third phase could be completed in 1974. Originally UNF was not due further construction after Phase II until 1975.

PSYCHOLOGY PROFS PUBLISH Dr. Peter L. Kranz, assistant professor of psychology, has had an article entitled, "Teachers as Play Therapists: An Experiment in Learning" published in the November issue of Childhood Education, a journal of the Association for Childhood Education International.

The article discusses the experimental program he conducted in Bakersfield, California utilizing elementary school teachers as "play therapists" within their own education institution.

Dr. Leslie Krieger, assistant professor of psychology, is featured as a reviewer of the book, The Sociology of Occupations, by Elliott A. Krause in the Autumn, 1972 edition of Personnel Psychology, a journal of applied research.

Dr. Krieger's review describes the work as detailing the world of work from a variety of perspectives, concluding that a radicalization of the world of work is now in progress.

STATE PAYS The Attorney General has ruled that the
HEALTH FEES State will contribute its share of the
FOR BOTH group health insurance premium for a
SPOUSES husband and wife when they are both full-
time employees of the State, whether or not they are
insured under separate single contracts or one family
contract.

Under a family contract the insurance should be carried in the husband's name, with the wife as the insured dependent. In some cases, particularly where the husband may be a nine-month faculty member and the wife a year-round employee, the State has said that the policy could be carried in the wife's name in order to benefit from State contributions during the summer months.

Any University employee who plans to carry the State Health Insurance Program for his/her family and whose spouse also works full time for the University or for another State agency should visit the Personnel Department in order to receive the State contribution for his spouse.

The insured employee will continue to pay his/her share of the family rate and the dependent spouse will be eligible to receive a State warrant for \$9.98 per month.
