PLACED As of Monday (Nov. 13), 304 students in the College of Education were assigned to public schools in Duval County for observation, tutoring, testing and teaching experiences, with the assistance of Mrs. Mary Frances Whittaker, of the Duval County School System's Operations Division. Additional students have been assigned to schools in Clay, Nassau and St. Johns Counties as well as to a few local private schools. By the end of the fall quarter as many as 600 students will have been assigned for field experiences.
