LEON M. LESSINGER, Ed.D.

Andrew A. Robinson, Jr., Eminent Scholar in Educational Policy and Economic Development

Today's commencement speaker, Dr. Leon M. Lessinger, is an internationally recognized educator. He was appointed in March 1989 as the first holder of the Andrew A. Robinson, Jr., Eminent Scholar Chair in Educational Policy and Economic Development at the University of North Florida.

Prior to joining the UNF faculty, Dr. Lessinger was president and chief executive officer of Health Champions, Inc., in Beverly Hills, California. The non-profit organization he headed specialized in developing programs for school-aged children which promote healthy and productive lifestyles.

Dr. Lessinger's career in education is impressive and distinguished. As a national education policy maker, he was chosen by former Vice President Hubert Humphrey to launch the National Teacher Corps and served as associate U.S. commissioner for elementary and secondary education with the U.S. Office of Education in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Lessinger served as professor and dean of the College of Education at the University of South Carolina, as holder of the Irving Melbo Chair in Educational Administration in the School of Education at the University of Southern California, and as the Callaway Professor of Education in the College of Education at Georgia State University, Atlanta.

On a local educational level, he was superintendent of two important California united school districts, Beverly Hills and Stockton. He also was superintendent of the San Mateo Union High School District and as assistant superintendent for curriculum and guidance and principal of the Grossmont Union

High School District in California.

Prior to superintendencies, he was the California Department of Education's chief research consultant and resident director of a legislative study of gifted and talented students. He also spent ten years as a classroom teacher in Los Angeles.

Extremely active in professional life, Dr. Lessinger has served as president of the Aerospace Education Foundation; chairman of the board of governors, Florida Legislature Educational Research and Development Program; vice chair of the Special Joint Education Committee to Study Minimal Competency in Basic Skills, created by the South Carolina Legislature; member of the National Commission for the Reform of Secondary Education; and a trustee for the Academic Decathlon.

Dr. Lessinger earned his Bachelor of Arts, Master of Education, and Doctor of Education degrees from the University of California, Los Angeles. He holds a second baccalaureate, the Bachelor of Science in mechanical engineering, from North Carolina State University. Dr. Lessinger received the honorary Doctor of Science degree from La Verne College in California. He holds life certification in California for public school service in elementary and secondary teaching, general administration and pupil personnel services. He also is a licensed psychologist in California.

Among his many honors is designation as a "Distinguished Professor" by the National Academy of School Executives of the American Association of School Administrators.

Traditions of the Commencement Ceremony

Academic regalia date to European universities of the Middle Ages, when gowns and hoods were required for warmth in unheated buildings. Gowns were fur-lined adaptations of the priestly toga, and hoods were worn to protect the tonsured heads of the priests. The regalia now serve as a visible reminder of the historic antecedents of intellectual pursuits.

In American universities of the late 19th century, these medieval costumes were revived to lend color to academic functions. Efforts were made to establish a code that would set standards for academic dress. Gowns of masters and doctors are generally ankle length and closed in front. The master's gown has pointed sleeves that are slit at the elbows. The doctoral gown has wide lapels of velvet, either black or the color of the scholar's specialization. The sleeves are full and bell-shaped, with three velvet chevrons, either black or colored like the lapels. Gowns normally are black, although some universities have designed their own in the colors of the institution.

The hood, which drapes over the back of the gown, carries the greatest symbolism of all components of the academic costume. Its length, width and colors denote the wearer's highest academic achievement and institution. The master's hood is pointed; the doctoral hood is bell-shaped. The color of the border of the hood indicates the scholar's major field of study; the lining color or colors identifies the institution that conferred the wearer's degree. Hoods were originally trimmed in fur, but now have satin borders for masters and velvet for doctors.

The customary head covering is the mortarboard, or Oxford cap, with a tassel on the left side. Those who possess the doctorate wear a tassel of gold metallic threads. The soft, large beret, modeled after the cap of Cambridge University, has also been adopted by some institutions.

The medieval university was much concerned with rank and privilege, and academic robes made visible the social and academic distinctions of the wearers. These distinctions have largely disappeared, and robes indicate specialization. The following colors are associated with the degrees frequently represented in academic processions:

The University of North Florida

The University of North Florida (UNF), one of nine institutions within the State University System of Florida, is a comprehensive urban university which offers degree programs at the baccalaureate and professional graduate levels. Established in 1965 as an upper division and professional graduate institution, the University began offering classes in 1972. In 1985, freshmen and sophomores were admitted for the first time.

The Florida Board of Regents appointed Thomas G. Carpenter as UNF's first president in 1969. He was succeeded by Curtis L. McCray in 1982, following the interim presidency of Andrew A. Robinson, Jr., from 1980-82. Roy E. McTarnaghan also served as interim president for six months until the arrival of UNF's current president, Adam W. Herbert, in February 1989.

The University is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. National accreditation has been achieved in the professional disciplines of business administration, teacher education, computer science and nursing.

UNF has been identified as one of the most selective comprehensive universities in America. In fall 1989, only one of every 4.5 applicants was enrolled as a freshman. Over the past five years, mean SAT scores of UNF's entering freshmen have increased by 100 points. With a mean SAT score of 1071 and grade point average of 3.26, UNF's current freshmen reflect the University's commitment to high quality undergraduate education.

UNF academic programs are built on a strong foundation in the traditional arts and sciences. The University offers 45 undergraduate degree and 26 master's degree programs through Colleges of Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Computer and Information Sciences, Education and Human Services, and Health. UNF has been authorized to plan for its first doctoral program, the Doctor of Education.

UNF demonstrates a continuing commitment to excellence in teaching, research and public service. The University's faculty is strongly committed to providing high-quality instruction, with particular emphasis on undergraduate education. Members of the faculty are simultaneously engaged in and produce a level of creative scholarship which demonstrates a determination to remain at the cutting edge of intellectual inquiry and practice in their respective disciplines. Through its centers and institutes, numerous continuing education programs and staff volunteer activities, the University is a major contributor to the total life of the First Coast region and the state of Florida.

Through the strong support of the University of North Florida Foundation, Inc., and the generosity of both corporate leaders and dedicated citizens of Florida's First Coast region, UNF now has four fully funded Eminent Scholar Chairs valued at over \$4 million: the Andrew A. Robinson, Jr., Chair in Educational Policy and Economic Development, the Ira M. Koger Chair in American Music, the Prime F. Osborn Chair in Transportation and the National Paper Trade Association Endowed Research Chair in Wholesaling.

The University of North Florida currently enrolls almost 7,800 student. It has 296 faculty and over 1,300 full-time and part-time staff. The total 1989-90 UNF budget exceeds \$40 million.
