




ON AN INTERNATIONAL NOTE

Because practically everyone in this country is either an immigrant or a descendant of immigrants — voluntary or otherwise, it is not too unusual that a musical aggregation would consist only of immigrants. But Jack Kleinsinger has put together his latest "Highlights in Jazz" program with a roster of musicians who migrated to perform what amounts to the only art form that is native to America — jazz.

Called "Jazz Is My Passport," the program will be presented tonight at 8 o'clock in the New York University Loeb Student Center, 566 LaGuardia Place, at Washington Square South. And the musicians are Toots Thielemans of Belgium, harmonica; Astrud Gilberto, singer, and Paulo Jobim, guitar, of Brazil; Adam Makowicz of Poland, piano; George Mraz of Czechoslovakia, bass; Carlos Franzetti of Argentina, piano; Vaiery Ponomarev of the Soviet Union, trumpet, and Ignacio Berros of Cuba, percussionist.

Jazz: Foreign Musicians In 'Highlights' Program

was presented in microcosm last Wednesday evening at the Loeb Auditorium as part of the "Highlights in Jazz" series. Jazz musicians from Poland, Czechoslovakia, the Soviet Union, Belgium, Cuba, Argentina and Brazil along with one American resident of France, the saxophonist Harold Singer, played a program that was notable for its variety as well as the extent of which these musicians from overseas have built on American sources rather than merely following them.

The most original of the musicians was also the one with the longest American career — Toots Thielemans, the Belgian guitarist, whistler and harmonica virtuoso who has been playing here for three decades. His program included be-bop, bosa nova and ballads, played with sensitivity and imagination that would have been remarkable even on an instrument more than three inches long.

The Polish pianist Adam, Makowicz, as half of a well-balanced duo with the Czechoslovak bassist George Mraz, showed a lean and spare approach and a use of provocatively.

jagged phrasing that gave his playing body, color and individuality.

The Brazilian singer Astrud Gilberto has found a livelier, more appealing stage personality than she had in her earlier appearances here but her singing style was still bland and her vocal range limited. In brief appearances as part of a quartet, the Russian trumpeter Valery Ponomarev projected an impressively crisp and crackling attack and the Cuban drummer Ignacio Berroa supported his fellow musicians with a powerful pulse that evoked both Big Sid Catlett and Art Blakey.
