MARY LANDRIEU

**“Landrieu has blazed a trail for other women in politics and set a high standard... for elected officials. As she walks out of the State treasurer’s office, Mary Landrieu leaves a legacy that few elected officials can match.”**

On October 21, 1995, Mary Landrieu came within 6900 votes—less than 1%—of making the run-off for governor of Louisiana. Landrieu’s \$3.8 million reform candidacy came close to winning despite being subject to an all-out attack by the old line political establishment and despite a highly splintered Democratic field. Three months later, Landrieu, who in 1987 was the youngest woman ever elected to statewide office in Louisiana, ended her eight years as Louisiana State Treasurer, which had been preceded by eight years in the State Legislature. Now, Landrieu, who leads in the polls for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by Democrat J. Bennet Johnston, is poised to be the first female Senator elected from the State of Louisiana.

As a Legislator in the 1980’s, she put women and children’s issues on the front burner long before “family values” became a popular concern for politicians, (*New Orleans Times-Picayune*, 1/96). She was an advocate for women, children, the disabled, and others whose voices tend to be ignored, (*New Orleans Times-Picayune*, 9/16/95). Her legislative record was one of “putting Louisiana’s people and families first,” *Shreveport Journal*, 10/6/95. She pushed through tough child support laws and measures to protect abused women, (*N.O. Times-Picayune*, 9/16/95).

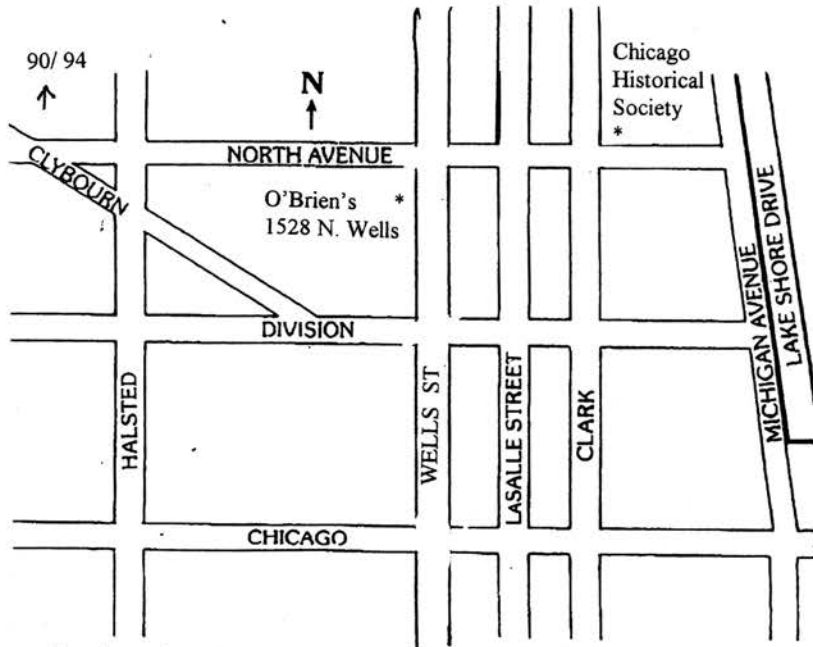
