

ABOUT NCJW

Established in 1893, the **National Council of Jewish Women** is the oldest Jewish women's organization in America. NCJW has more than 100,000 members in 200 Sections nationwide that are active in the organization's priority areas of **Women's Issues, Jewish Life, Aging, Children and Youth, Israel, and Constitutional rights.**

NCJW Jacksonville Section has been instrumental in developing and implementing many significant programs in our community, currently including:

P.A.C.E. - Practical and Cultural Education - a structured academic and vocational program for teenage girls who have become involved in the court system as status offenders.

Mental Health Forum - a one-day public forum of mini-workshops, such as: coping with personal relationships, family life and stresses, co-sponsored with the Mental Health Association.

Kosher Kart - delivery of balanced, hot meals to homebound individuals.

Guardian Ad Litem - a volunteer program for court appointed child advocates to represent abused and neglected children in judicial hearings.

Tallahassee Institute - a conclave of concerned women advocating the issues of NCJW priorities to legislative representatives.

Ship-A-Box - packaging and sending personal articles to children in Israel.

Pre-School Vision Screening - Since 1971, Council has participated in an eye screening program for the benefit of public and private kindergarten students. Hundreds of children have been tested under this program each year.

Social Legislation - Through programs and study groups, and in accordance with recommendations from national and state legislative chairwomen, this committee brings legislation to the members and recommends actions.

Green Circle Program - Volunteers present a three session dialogue with second graders to promote a positive sense of self-worth and a better understanding of human differences and similarities in children.

Art Enrichment Program - Picture Ladies - In cooperation with the Jacksonville Art Museum and the Duval County school system, volunteers are trained to go into classrooms on a regular basis to supplement the art resource program in public and private schools.

This year we will be honoring three **Women in Power** who are member of the Jacksonville Jewish Community...

Ann R. Shorstein was born in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Ann moved to Jacksonville in 1968. She is married to Harry Shorstein and the mother of Bryan 17 and Paul 15.



Educated at the University of Florida, Ann graduated in 1963 with a B.A. in Education and highest honors in Speech Pathology and Audiology. She has served as a speech therapist in Brevard, Palm Beach and Duval Counties and taught migrant children during the sixties in South Florida. At present she serves as a real-estate broker for Sam Folds and has been employed in this field for nearly ten years.

Ann has been deeply involved in many political campaigns dating back to the sixties presidential campaign of Eugene McCarthy and the Robert King High Gubernatorial effort.

In both 1974 and 1986 she managed Steve Pajcic's campaign for State Legislature and his bid for Governor. She presently heads the Tommy Hazouri campaign for Mayor of Jacksonville.



Nancy Dreicer is Vice President - Corporate Resources for American Transtech Inc., an AT&T company headquartered in Jacksonville, Florida.

Nancy, a journalism major, graduated with honors from Douglass College, and received her Bachelor of Arts degree in 1971. As a part of a special program for selected managers, Nancy attended Harvard Business School's Executive Training which focused on managing organizational change.

She was Director of Fund Raising for Major Firms for the United Way of Central Jersey. She serves as a board member of the Jacksonville Women's Business Owner, and President of the Policy Board of Inroads. She is also treasurer of the Jacksonville Women's Network and the member of the Florida Industry council for the State Board of Education. In 1986, Nancy received the Executive Women of New Jersey "Salute to the Policy Makers" award.

She and her husband, Scott, live in Jacksonville with their two sons, Jarret and Jesse.

Ronnie Rosenbaum is practically a native of Jacksonville. Although born in Chicago, she has lived here since she was ten and loves Jacksonville, its people, its beaches, its southern climate.



After her marriage to Jerrold Rosenbaum, Ronnie graduated magna cum laude from Jacksonville University and received a M.A. in English from the University of Florida.

She taught English at Fletcher High School, took a few years off to have two daughters, Laurie and Beth, and then began a retailing career in the family business. The business proved both motivating and challenging to Ronnie as she involved herself in the evolving saga of the development of the first the Body Shops and then Jarrod's. As president of this growing enterprise, Ronnie is constantly stimulated by the challenge of staying on the cutting edge of a field that is highly volatile, competitive and demanding. Body Shops and Jarrod's have over 100 stores in ten southern states and project a volume in 1987 of over 75 million dollars.

Ronnie has begun creating her own product line called Rinzi International Collection for Body Shops, and a separate Jarrod's label for her updated division. Soon 75 to 80% of the store's merchandise will be in her own brands.
