Women Take Back the Night is an international tradition with marches and rallies occurring around the world since 1976. That year, in Belgium, women attending the International Tribunal on Crimes Against Women marched together in solidarity, holding candles to protest the ways in which violence permeates the lives of women worldwide.

The highlight of Take Back the Night is the march when women walk through the night and reclaim the streets, which for many years have been sources of fear and violence. Another important aspect of Take Back the Night is the survivor testimonials. This serves as a safe place for survivors of sexual violence to come forward with testimonials, often sharing their experiences for the first time. The Clothesline Project gives victims and survivors of violence an opportunity to tell their stories in a unique and exceedingly powerful way. Symbolic of "hanging out our dirty laundry," or disclosing the secrets that we were told to keep and the shame we were made to feel for our own abuse, each shirt tells a story of one victim's pain, survival and healing.

Everyone in Jacksonville needs to be aware of and involved in confronting violence against women. The Jacksonville Sheriff's Office documented 1,101 cases of forcible rape and other forcible sex offenses in 2000. According to the National Victim Center, only 18% of such cases are ever reported, therefore, the actual number of occurrences in Duval County may have been as high as 5,000.

In 2000, the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office wrote 8,233 domestic violence incidence reports and 10 women lost their lives due to domestic violence homicides. Across the county, a woman is battered every 15 seconds.

A Message To Men

We know most of you would never beat or rape your wife, your lover, a date, your child, or a stranger. We live and work with you. We love and respect you. You are our fathers, uncles, husbands, brothers, companions, friends, and lovers.

But there are men who are violent. Children learn fear, brutality, humiliation from them. These men destroy individuals and families.

The next time you hear a man say he's going to show her who's boss...

Tell him that hitting, slapping, and shoving are wrong. Tell him that you handle your anger and aggression differently. You talk things out when you disagree with your partner.

Tell him that women do not ask to be raped. Tell him you never force sex no matter how much money you spent or how long you've been dating. Tell him that "yes" means "yes" and everything else means "no."

The next time you see or hear one of us in trouble, pay attention! As one rape survivor notes, "Rape is a soul murder." We cannot stop the violence by ourselves.
